

SUTTON CASE HAS VERY UGLY LOOK

Private Kennedy Tells Straight-forward Story, Supporting Theory of Mother and Sister.

WAS RELUCTANT TO TESTIFY.

Lieut. Adams and Utley Cautioned Him Not to Say Anything About What He Had Seen.

Annapolis, Md., July 26.—Today's session of the board of inquiry investigating the circumstances surrounding the death of Lieut. James N. Sutton of the marine corps, who was mysteriously shot two years ago, afforded some surprise in the testimony given by Charles W. Kennedy, now a private in the marine corps of Norfolk, Va., and Surgeon A. D. McCormick, U. S. N.

Kennedy told a frank, straightforward story of some of the incidents prior to the shooting. His testimony supported the contention of Sutton's mother and sister, that Sutton did not seek the fight with Adams and the other officers.

In attacking his credibility, Maj. Leonard, judge advocate, went into Kennedy's record and showed he had been disciplined on several occasions in the service.

Kennedy said he had been reluctant to mention his part in the affair, because Lieut. Adams and Adams had both admonished him to "keep quiet." On his way to receive a sentry at 1 o'clock on the morning of the shooting, he had come upon Sutton, Adams, and a German and Utley in an angry argument, the witness said. Adams was in his shirt sleeves ready for a fight.

"All right, Adams, if you want to fight, I'll fight you," the witness testified he heard Sutton say. "They fought hard for a few minutes and Sutton's face was bloody, when Utley stopped the fight."

He said he saw the two fight again as he was going to his post. Half an hour later Kennedy heard the shots, and soon after Adams appeared and questioned the information to Kennedy that Sutton had shot himself, and that Adams had had his finger shot off.

Utley also told him Sutton had killed himself, the witness said. Next morning he saw Lieut. Adams and Utley go to the edge of the parade grounds and pick up a service revolver, which Utley carried into the barracks with him.

Kennedy's testimony was not shaken on cross-examination.

Dr. McCormick was present at the autopsy held on Sutton's body and examined the bullet wound, he testified. He located the wound back of and slightly above the right ear, while Dr. Pleckert testified it was near the top of the head.

Several former witnesses denied that any of them had handed a revolver to Sgt. DeHart on the night of the shooting, as DeHart testified.

Walla Walla, Wash., July 26.—John Allen, a convict, was instantly killed and Joseph Read, another convict, was shot through the arm today at the penitentiary after they had refused to obey the orders of Guard Fred Staff to stop fighting.

AMERICAN WORKMEN WILL BE GIVEN PREFERENCE

Pittsburg, July 26.—The strike at the Standard Steel Car company's plant at Butler was ended today when more than 2,000 former employees returned to work at the company's terms. Seven of the leaders of the strike movement were discharged.

Officials of the company state that hereafter American workmen will be given the preference in all departments. Deputy sheriffs on guard along the Ohio river bank near the Pressed Steel Car company's water plant at McKees Rocks fired on an attacking party at 3 o'clock this morning in answer to a shot fired by the strikers, and several men in a rowboat. One man is reported to have been shot. The object of the attack at the water plant is unknown.

Rumors of the importation of new men as employees at the plant today caused the strikers to establish picket lines as early as 4 a. m. and for three hours all street cars were halted while a committee questioned each passenger. The state constabulary has called out to enforce order in the dispersing crowd. There were no additional men at work today.

STARVED TO DEATH.

Is what could truthfully be said of a small child who died here last night. The child, a poor little thing—three years old—was found lying on the sidewalk, its face as pale as paper, its body emaciated and its limbs stiff. It was found by a passerby who called the police. The child was taken to the hospital, but it died before it could be examined. The cause of death is believed to be starvation.

REMARKABLE RESULTS OF USING CHEMICALS ON PLANTS

Berkeley, Cal., July 27.—In a lecture before a large number of professors at the University of California yesterday, Dr. D. D. MacDougal, for many years head of the desert botanical laboratory of the Carnegie Institute, and later connected with the branch laboratory at Tucson, Ariz., announced that he had produced unique results by the use of chemicals upon plants.

He said that by spraying the pollen of the desert plant with solutions of calcium and iodine, he has produced radical changes in the derivatives, and

that by hybridizing the derivatives with natural plants of the same species, he has obtained new and valuable results. He announced that he had taken plants with coarse serrated leaves and with chemicals had produced plants whose leaves are of fine and smooth texture. Dr. MacDougal was formerly in charge of the New York botanical gardens, and later was connected with the University of Minnesota.

INTEREST ON DEPOSITS OF ENLISTED MEN

Washington, July 27.—Interest on deposits of enlisted men will hereafter be computed by excluding the date of deposit and including the date of discharge of the soldiers, according to a decision of the treasury department. There has been considerable diversity of opinion as to whether the first or the last day should be excluded. Both days cannot be included in figuring the interest.

CHARGED WITH USING U. S. MAILS TO DEFRAUD

Washington, July 27.—Charged with using the mails to defraud, J. C. McNulty, president and H. Van Vleet, secretary and treasurer of the American Civil Service Institute, incorporated, were locked up last night after having been arrested by postal inspectors.

McNulty and Van Vleet are alleged to be prominent financiers of Buffalo, N. Y. It is said the corporation with which they are connected has received within the last two months thousands of dollars from the promotion of New York, Buffalo, Detroit and other large cities.

The object of the institute, which was incorporated under the laws of Delaware April 1, 1907, with a capital stock of \$250,000, is to instruct applicants to the methods necessary to obtain federal civil service positions.

Recent advertisements have appeared for district superintendents in large cities, subjecting \$50,000 of the concern's stock being received by applicants.

Van Vleet told the police \$150,000 of the capital of the concern had been invested in bonds which were locked up in a safe deposit vault of a Washington loan and trust company. He could not, however, recall the name of the institution.

WIND TOO STRONG FOR WRIGHT TO MAKE TRIAL

Washington, July 26.—Orville Wright made a two and a half-mile flight under adverse conditions with his aeroplane at Fort Myer this evening. The occasion, by reason of the presence of President Taft and a brilliant assemblage of Washington officials, bore an air more social than aeronautic.

Everybody had expected Wright to make the first of his official so-called "endurance" test of an hour in his plane, with a passenger. The last time he attempted this feat, only 10 months ago, it cost the life of Lieut. Selfridge of the signal corps.

A strong wind caused postponement of the expected trial, and all that Wright attempted was a brief flight without a passenger.

With President Taft, Speaker Cannon and Senator Aldrich looking on, the machine was trundled to the foot of the starting derrick, in the center of the drill field, and amid the monorial preparatory to the start.

CANADA WILL BUILD A NAVY OF HER OWN

Victoria, B. C., July 26.—That Canada will build a navy to co-operate with the British navy in the defense of the empire was stated by Hon. William Pugsley, Dominion minister of public works, before the board of trade here today. He said:

"I look forward to seeing a number of first-class vessels of war, of purely Canadian origin, and manned by Canadians, stationed on both the Atlantic and Pacific seaports."

"The question of a Canadian navy and dry docks on both the Pacific and Atlantic will be discussed as soon as the delegates to the imperial defense conference return from England. The outcome of the conference undoubtedly will be a decision to construct dry docks on both Canadian seaboard capable of accommodating the largest battleships."

A SCRATCHING HEN UNCOVERS STOLEN JEWELRY

New York, July 27.—When jewelry valued at about \$1,000 was stolen from the home of William H. Skinner of Lakewood, N. J., in April, he offered a reward of \$200 for its recovery. A hen's scratching under the front porch of the Skinner home has brought the stolen jewelry to light, uncovering the spot where the thief had apparently buried the treasure.

CONGRESS CUTS OFF A TELEPHONE GRAFT

Washington, July 27.—The expense of furnishing telephones in the residences of certain officers of the public health and marine hospital service, detailed for exclusive duty in connection with the examination of arriving aliens cannot be paid during the present fiscal year from the appropriations for regulating immigration, says the controller of the treasury.

This follows a specific declaration by Congress that these officers can no longer be reimbursed for their telephones in connection with the carrying out of their medical inspection.

THE MICHIGAN BEST BATTLESHIP IN THE NAVY

Washington, July 26.—Having in her official trials fully met the rigid requirements of United States naval constructors, the new first class battleship Michigan, it was announced today, probably will be turned over to the government early in August.

This splendid new ship, which thus far is the speediest war vessel of her class, will make the navy's twenty-eighth first class battleship.

Five other battleships, a sister ship of the Michigan and four others more powerful and speedier, at present are under construction, and 25,000-ton battleships have been authorized by Congress. These will increase the American battleship fleet to 35.

Naval officers who witnessed the trials of the Michigan declare she will be capable of making an average speed

of 20 knots. They regard her as the best battleship in the navy. On her final trial at sea, which ended at Philadelphia Sunday, the ship made record time. It is unofficially reported she exceeded 10 knots.

PUBLIC GETS THE NEWS IT WANTS TO GET

Chautauque, N. Y., July 27.—Just what the public wants to get in its newspapers it gets, according to Dean Shaler Mathews, of the University of Chicago divinity school, who answered some critics of the press in a lecture on modern social conditions at the Chautauque assembly yesterday.

"The rank and file of editors and publishers don't want to do that which the public does not want them to do," said Dr. Mathews. "They are only too eager to do what the public wants them to do. They print what their readers want to see in print. The public has it all in its own hands."
