Mormonism in New Zealand.

CHRISTCHURCH,
March 27th, 1880.

Editors Deseret News:

Elder E. F. Pierce left New Zealand on the 3rd of March, leaving your humble servant in charge of the mission. I being in the south country, was obliged to return to the city of Christchurch, being the most central place. Elder T. A. Shreeve left here two weeks since for the North Island, via Wellington to Napier, and probably he will labor there until he receives his release, it being now two years since he was called; he is, I guess, expecting it. Elder John Sorensen is at present in Auckland, feeling very well. I feel sorry that we have not good English speaking brethren to labor in such cities, then the two last Elders from Zion could visit the Scandinavian settlements. Elder Neils Gronlund is very unwell; he has not enjoyed good health here yet, the weather being so changeable. He has tried several parts, but Christchurch agrees with him best. With this mail a small company of the Saints will leave Babylon to find a home with the people of God in the mountains. They are all good folks. Elder William Burnett, who has charge of the company, has given more means to this mission than any other man. And I joyfully recommend him with the rest as faithful Latter-day Saints to the Saints in Utah.

We are doing the very best we can under the circumstances. But if we had six more good Elders with us, men filled with the Holy Ghost, and who would preach the gospel regardless of trouble, we could do much more. For one I do not believe in being ashamed of any of the principles which God has given to the human family in our day. I should consider myself a coward if I would not preach the "Word of Wisdom" and the laws of fasting, tithing and plural marriage, as they are just as much gospel as the first four principles of our holy religion. Editors of late have tried to drive us from the colony; and if lies could have done it, we would not now be here. But notwithstanding the public press is stained with heaven-daring falsehoods against us, we still live and prosper.

Last week I baptized a very fine schoolmaster and his wife, by the name of Vincent. Three children had the fever, and were all healed by anointing. This makes forty persons I have baptized since my arrival, but in humility I say let the praise be given to our Father in Heaven, as the great work of converting men and women belongs to him.

We all look forward with the pleasure to the Grand Jubilee, which will shortly take place in Salt Lake City. We shall not pass the day without enjoying ourselves in a good party, and rejoice that the day has arrived when Joseph Smith the Prophet said the power of our enemies would begin to weaken. I would be glad to see the poor Saints gathered home, from every clime. A few families here who are very poor indeed, feel discouraged, on account of the elders promising to assist them to gather, when they got home. But they say, "They never write us now, much more than send us means." It shows that our word should be honored. If those brethren should read this that are concerned, they will, I have no doubt, remember their covenant, they being good brethren, and surrounded with the blessings of life in the well watered valleys of Ephraim.

We did think of the Saints coming in sailing ships instead of steamers, but we have now got a 20 per cent reduction, at this rate the fare from New Zealand is about \$125 to Ogden City, a large sum for poor people.

We hope still to receive the DESERET NEWS, which was sent Brother Pearce every mail. Our hearts would be sad without it. We are expecting a large order of books from Liverpool, which will be a great blessing to us. The other box I thought was lost came safely to hand after visiting Australia.

I was very thankful for a kindly letter from President John Taylor. All the Saints were delighted with it, and we all felt encouraged by the word of the Lord from Zion.

I hope we shall not be forgotten next Conference, and shortly after we expect to see some strong, healthy Elders with us, as this mission is as important as any I know of.

Every day I more than ever rea-

lize the promises of the Lord made to me before I left my Zion home. I have had no sickness, and have enjoyed myself first rate. May heavens choicest blessings rest down upon all true Latter-day Saints, till the kingdom is independent and Jesus reigns king of the nations whose right it is. Ever praying for this happy time, and willing to toil for the same, I remain your humble brother in the new and everlasting covenant of peace and salvation.

April 27, 1880, at the residence of her son, Bishop W. F. Nuttall, Wallsburg, Wasatch County, Utah, of old age, MARY, relict of the late William Nuttall.

Deceased was born December 22, 1798. She was baptized a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, with her husband and family at Liverpool, England, on the 10th of October, 1850, by Elder John Taylor, and emigrated to Utah, leaving Liverpool on the 6th of March, 1852, and crossed the plains with the Deseret Manufacturing Sugar Company's machinery, arriving at Salt Lake City after a tedious journey on the 6th day of September of the same year. She resided the greater part of the time at Provo city, Utah County, with her late husband, William Nuttall and family, until his demise in March, 1864, and since that time with her sons, and for the past four years with her son William E.

Deceased was the cousin of President John Taylor, and a kind and exemplary Latter-day Saint; was the much esteemed and greatly respected mother of Elders Wm. E. L. John and Joseph Nuttall, who were with her at her bedside and during her last moments, to comfort her declining hours; they had been telegraphed to respecting her sudden and last illness. She had enjoyed a degree of good health until last Saturday morning, at which time she took to her bed and gradually sank away. She departed as she had lived, in peace and good will with all, in the hope of a glorious resurrection with the just; leaving her sons and their families, many relatives and a host of warm, sincere and devoted friends to mourn her temporary loss.

The remains of deceased were brought to Provo on Wednesday evening last and consigned to their last resting place, by the side of her late husband, in the Provo cemetery, after the funeral services, held in the meeting house, on Thursday. A large number of citizens attended the services and followed the remains to the cemetery.



She in company with her husband resided in Nauvoo, Ill., till the year 1846, from which place they were driven by the hand of persecution. Her husband came as a pioneer to this Valley, she remaining back till 1849, in which year she arrived in Salt Lake Valley. She was a good wife, a kind mother, and a faithful Latter-day Saint. She leaves 6 children and 18 grandchildren to mourn her loss. She died as she had lived in full faith of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.—[COM.]


