The election held at Mapleton, Oregon, on the 16th inst., will probably result in \$5,000 Chinese taken this year.

The Oriental imports received at Tacoma for the past twelve months were valued at \$10,477,822. Of this over \$5,000,000 was for silk.

There have been 5,700 boxes of apples, 1,514 boxes of pears and nearly 500 barrels of hops shipped from Oregon's farm, Oregon, since September 1st.

Charles E. Mayo, the ex-Oregon farmer who is held at Los Angeles, has been released from the Oregon court of California on the ground of ill health.

William Henderson, a well known stock dealer and farmer of the Palmdale, Calif., district, who is now in the hospital, received several wires from a horse stealing band in the last few days.

W. J. McKeown, a young druggist, apparently shot by a companion while working a week ago in the hospital, died at the hospital Sunday night from the effects of the wound.

It is announced from Portland, Oregon, that the Burlington railway has a good prospect of winning the Union Pacific to allow it a western terminal station at Puget Sound in Portland.

Monday afternoon \$11,000.00 was paid into the Los Angeles county, Cal., treasury by the treasurer of the County Auditor Eli Hammond, being the amount of Hammond's delinquency, with interest at 7 per cent up to November 1st.

A South Seattle, Washington, territorial agent named Newman has been indicted by the federal grand jury for using the mails to advertise fraudulently that he had a \$10,000 twenty-year-old son who he wished to find a suitable husband.

The faculty at the Nebraska state university announced on Dec. 17, 1895, a school of agriculture will be opened in connection with the university. The session will last twelve weeks. The courses will be in agriculture, with which there is no good opportunity to become acquainted on the farm.

The Mexican war veterans in California are moving for a grand battle in Monterey, to commence on July 4 and end on July 7 next, to celebrate the fifth anniversary of the signing of the American flag in California. The secretary Harriet has promised that all the available ships of the navy within reach of Monterey harbor on that date shall be ordered there on the occasion for a naval display.

Another big water scheme has been instituted at San Jose, Cal. A. G. Field filed a motion Monday for the court's order to the effect that he claims all the water in the stream known as the Coyote creek and in its tributaries, flowing to the extent of 14,400 inches, measured under a four-inch pressure. The plan of the project is to dam the waters of the Coyote creek and form a reservoir, bringing an immense tract of land.

Three masked men held up thirteen men in a store at the Vista mine near Lake City, Oregon, Saturday night, and took the contents of the safe, which was \$1. The outlaws entered the front door and the command, "Throw up your hands!" was given, in which an attempt was made to force the thirteen men in the store, the crowd believing a joke was being perpetrated, as they had just been released from the state prison and held outlaws. Two men fired over their heads and were released to join them that the two men, however, and all inside went up. Mr. Brooks, the proprietor, had about \$800 scattered outside the safe and his loss was consequently light. The robbers escaped.

News comes from Boise City, Idaho, of an interesting case decided by the supreme court there on Monday—that of William M. Smith Jr., son of a well-known Utah mining man, who was sent to the penitentiary November 20, 1894, for two years for stealing \$400 in money, a gold watch and a small box of tools from the safe of the Gold Hill mining company at Quartzburg. The supreme court finds that there is no legal evidence against him, and for his discharge. There was an eighth conviction of 1893 to the money given and such a piece was found on the night Smith was released, but the piece was not identified. The court holds that the case of the state was so weak that it takes the usual course of discharging the prisoner.

Word comes from Hartsville, Or., that an unknown assassin attempted to murder Miss Ethel Hildie, aged 19, Saturday night. The girl lives with her uncle George Henderson, and after supper she had washed the dishes and had stepped out of the back door to throw out a pail of water, when she was seized by a man in the darkness who stabbed her in the neck and cut her across the wrist. She broke away and ran screaming toward the house. Mr. Henderson, hearing her screams, ran to the door, where her assailant fled. The physician who was summoned, found the girl would not recover, the stab in her neck having cut into an artery. Two hours later Miss Hildie says her life has been attempted, she having been found upon the ground. Her assailant was not recognized and the only theory as to the cause of the attempted murder is that the deed was prompted by jealousy of a rejected rival.
