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Senate's Interpretation of New **Election Law Disqualifies**

Thousands.

PURPOSE OPENLY AVOWED.

To Get Rid of Those Who Are Too Easily Swaved by Revolutionary Agitators.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 7 .- The chances of the Socialists in the coming election of members to parliament were dealt a sweeping blow yesterday by the lifterpretation given by the senate to the new election law, which at one stroke distranchises thousands of poorer classes. City employes, the operating personnel of the railroads and even the nurder of Deputy Herzenstein in Fin-land last summer has been ascribed, had sentenced the former premier, Count Witte, to death in the event of his return to Russia. locomotive engineers and the most skilled and highest paid labor in Russia are affected by the interpretation, Oui-side of factory workmen, the ranks of the Socialist party are recruited chiefly

from railroad men. This interpretation is supplementary o the senate's ruling of Oct. 20, from which it was estimated that over half a million persons who voted in the last election had been cut from the election

election had been cut from the election lists. These two rulings, together undo to a great extent the extension of the suffrage proclaimed by Count Witte in December last year. Their object was today frankly avowed by a member of the cabinet to be to rid the electorate of that class of voters which is too easily swayed by the influence of revolutionary agita-tors. This official, who is one of the few surviving ministers of the old regime, doubted whether the restrictions of the suffrage or the execution of Premier Stolypin's program of agrarian, politic-Stolypin's program of agrarian, politic-al and religious reforms would be effec-tive in producing a new parliament less tive in producing a new parliament less oppositional than the first one. Contin-uing, this member of the cabinet ex-pressed the conviction that it probably would be found necessary to dismiss the new parliament with a shorter shift than the first one, and make a sweep-ing revision in the election laws before summoning a third body.
