## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THEATRE TO-NIGHT.**—Remember the Theatre-to-night. The drama of "Eustache Baudin" is very beautiful, and has not been played here for nearly seven years; the face of "Slasher and Crasher" is uproarious. The entertainment is just the thing for a summer night, and in the hands of McKenzie, Margrets, Mackintosh and Bowring, Miss Colebrook, Mrs. A. Clavon, the well-known favorite Mrs. Della Clavon, Mrs. Romney, Miss Platt, and others, competent to do justice to the parts assigned them, it cannot fail to give the most genuine satisfaction. **MOUNTAIN MARBLE.**—Brother Alfred Moyle, reached this city yesterday, with several blocks of White Marble, from the Alpine, Utah County, marble quarry. The quarry is said to be very large, is only thirty miles from this city, and the quality of the marble is pronounced, by judges, to be equal to the celebrated marbles of Italy. This is a branch of the mineral development that may be made a source of real wealth and benefit to the Territory.

**SENTENCE COMMUTED.**—It will be remembered by some of our readers that Thomas Knapp was tried, some time since, in the District Court, in this city, for the murder of the negro woman, Jones, at Ogden City. He was to have been executed on the 17th of last month, but was respite for thirty days by the Governor. Today that time expires and the sentence of law would have been carried out, but Knapp has been made the recipient of further executive clemency, his sentence having been committed to imprisonment for life by Governor Shaffer.

**HOME AGAIN.**—Bishop John Sharp and his son James, who have been for some time past on business in Boston, Mass., reached home last night.

**THAT EXCURSION YESTERDAY** was an immense affair. Eight car loads and a caboose of men, women and children constituted the company of pleasure seekers, all of whom had a good time. The train, not unaccountably crowded, left the depot at a few minutes before eight o'clock, switched off at Wood's Cross for about three-quarters of an hour to allow the down train to pass, and reached Ogden at eleven a.m. Here the party had two hours' time given them to visit their friends, eat dinner and see what of Ogden was most interesting. At one o'clock the cars were re-filled and a start made to return to Lake Side, but there being some "little late," the train backed up again to take the "stragglers," and in about an hour the company were again out of the cars and footing it to the grove, where the platform, the swings, the bathing and boating were made the most of. Just before six the return trip was commenced and the excursionists arrived in the city at about half-past six p.m. There was no accident; plenty of enjoyment, and, considering the number of the company—about six hundred and fifty—the committee and the marshal of the day deserve especial mention for their unceasing efforts, which caused the whole affair to pass off so smoothly and pleasantly. We must also speak in favor of the care manifested by the Bishops and Superintendents over the children of the schools. The Brass Band lentened the excursionists and the residents of Ogden by playing at intervals some of their best tunes.

Bro. Peter Sinclair, Marshal of the Day, writing of the above excursion, says:

"The propitious weather, courtesy and attention of the officers and employees of the U. C. R. R., the manifest unanimous disposition on the part of the excursionists to make each other happy, the positive adaptation of the cars for comfort and convenience for such excursions, the variety of sources for enjoyment and exercises provided, all combined to make yesterday's treat a rich affair—long to be remembered. Indeed I learned that there is a huge excursion being organized to come off at an early day. The arrangements on the line and connected therewith are so eminently satisfactory that I shall certainly seek to become a member of the prospective party. I am happy to be able to state that no accident of any kind occurred to mar yesterday's enjoyment. The kingdom is growing."

PENNSYLVANIA.

Dahlgren Interred.

**PHILADELPHIA.**—The remains of Admiral Dahlgren have been interred at Laurel Hill.

CALIFORNIA.

**Chinese advices.**—Honors to the family of Burlingame -- By Emigration Scheme--Dangerous Cattle and Hog disease--Excitement among German and French Residents.

**SAN FRANCISCO.**—Private advices from China say that it is probable representations will be made to the Imperial government which will lead to the prohibition of female emigration to California, and to the establishment of a Chinese Consulate in this city. The government feels the loss of Burlingame very much. Besides pecuniary benefits, his family will have conferred upon them a posthumous title of the highest rank outside the Imperial family.

The promoters of the great immigration project have purchased seven million acres of land in Northern California and Southern Oregon along the line of the California and Oregon Railroad, at a cost of ten millions. They propose to aid a hundred thousand people to emigrate from Germany and Northern Europe to settle this land.

The disease which appeared among the cattle several weeks since is pronounced dangerous to human life; it has also developed itself among the hogs.

The war with France and Prussia is the absorbing topic on change to-day. There is great excitement among the German and French residents. The Consul of the North German confederation has notified German vessels to be cautious against French naval ships, several of the latter being between Panama and San Francisco. Three German ships are now at Portland Oregon. There is one here and ten on the way.

## FOREIGN NEWS.

PRUSSIA.

**Unlimited Support of King William.**  
**BERLIN.**—The Berrhenworth, of the North German Confederation, met here to-day. The Prussian King is already in session. The chiefs of all parties assure the King of their unqualified approval of his dignified and energetic attitude. A resolution has been adopted, according unlimited credit for national defence.
