

JEWETT COULD NOT BE SAVED.

The Suicidal Barber at Last Has Accomplished His Purpose.

WAS THE FIFTH ATTEMPT.

Many Things Turned His Mind to Suicide—The Germ of His Trouble Was Over His Wife.

Fred Jewett's fifth attempt upon his life accomplished its gruesome end. The wretched man died shortly after midnight last night at the police station.

So determined was Jewett to die that the final attempt was the third within the last week. He was discovered under the influence of the drug Thursday night, and was taken to the police station, where his effects were soon worked off.

Jewett had a wife and two children in Aspen, Colorado. He had trouble with his wife about two years ago, and they separated. He brooded over it so much that he at last said that he would rather die than live apart from his wife.

CASES OF SMALLPOX.

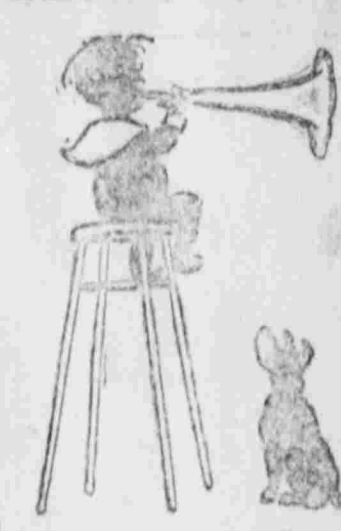

COMPULSORY VACCINATION.

Will be Strongly Opposed by the Anti-Compulsory League.

IS NOT A POLITICAL CONCERN.

Executive Committee Meet and Decide to Ask Legislative Candidates to Define their Position on the Question.

The executive committee of the Utah Anti-Compulsory Vaccination League held a meeting last evening in accordance with the call issued by the secretary, and transacted considerable business designed to offset the efforts now being made by the local medical board to fasten a compulsory vaccination law on the people of this State.

The following gentlemen (with one exception) who compose the executive board of the league, were present, or sent messages explaining their unavoidable absence and endorsing the purpose for which the special meeting had been called: D. C. Dunbar, John T. Axton, Wm. J. Silver, Thos. Hull, B. H. Schettler, N. Y. Schofield, Oliver Hodgson, D. Harrington, T. H. Griffith, Hyrum J. Smith, J. H. Farry and C. S. Booth.

The secretary was instructed to prepare and mail a letter to each candidate for the Legislature and Supreme bench in the coming election asking them to define their position on the question.

The league will continue any political bias in this matter. There are well known Democrats, Republicans and Populists on the executive board, and the only object of the league is to fight the "compulsory" phase of the vaccination question.

FOR THE DEATH OF A HUSBAND.

Mrs. Jessie Stevenson Sues Utah Light & Power Co. for \$1,300.

Jessie Stevenson, widow of Alexander Stevenson, who was killed while adjusting carbons on an arc lamp on Third South street on the night of June 9th last, filed a suit against the Utah Light and Power company in the Third district court today to recover \$1,300 for the death of her husband.

WILL RECOMMEND DECREE OF DIVORCE.

Testimony Taken in the Divorce Suit of Best vs Best.

GROUND IS NON-SUPPORT.

Mrs. Best Said Her Husband Had Failed to Provide for Her for the Past Nine Months.

Deputy County Clerk George E. Blair yesterday afternoon took testimony in the divorce case of Edith B. Best vs Alfred Best, Jr., and will recommend to the court the granting of a decree in accordance with the prayer of plaintiff's complaint.

At the hearing Mrs. Best was represented by the law firm of Ferguson, Cannon & Tanner, while her husband was represented by Attorney J. M. Hamilton. The defendant was not present in court.

Plaintiff, whose maiden name was Bennion, in answer to Mr. John M. Cannon, testified that she married the defendant on November 20th, 1898. Since January last, she said, the defendant had done nothing at all for her support, notwithstanding the fact that he is an able-bodied man, capable of earning a living for even both if he so desired.

James Hendry, a resident of Forest Dale, testified that he had known the defendant for the past six or seven years. A year ago witness had a conversation with the defendant at witness' place of business in Mill Creek.

Witness asked defendant if he meant to include the defendant in the reply he received was in the affirmative. From that time on witness would not permit any person to draw on the defendant's account, although he would have allowed Mrs. Best to have goods but for defendant's order.

In addition to a decree Mr. Blair recommends that the plaintiff be allowed to assume her maiden name of Edith Bennion and that the defendant be required to pay the sum of \$300 alimony as follows: One hundred dollars from the date of the decree and \$200 within six months thereafter.

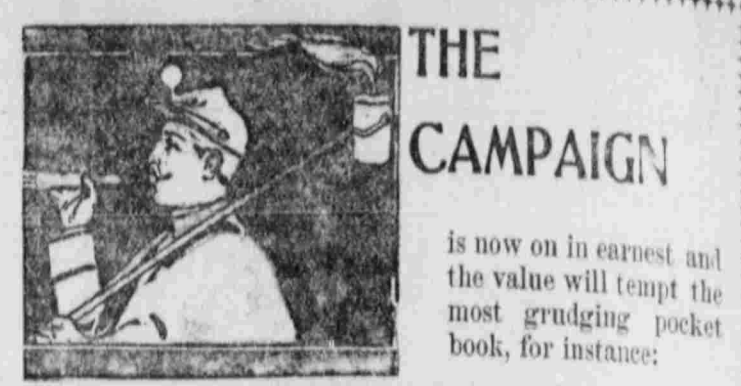
F. S. Richards and S. A. King are touring Summit county in the interests of Democracy.

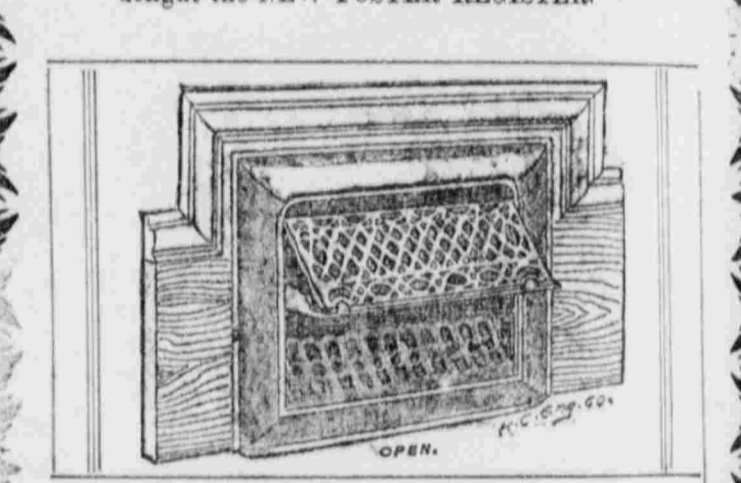

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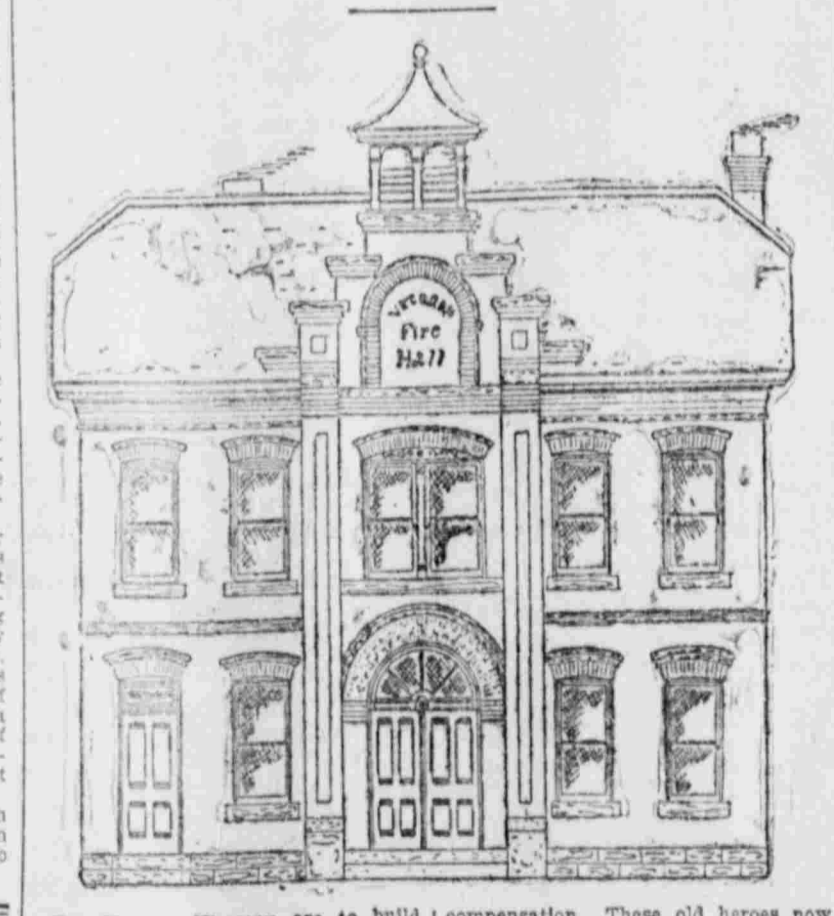
