

NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE.

CULLER, Stokes Co., N. C.,
September 16, 1884.

Editor Deseret News:

The following is the report of the North Carolina Conference which convened at Ebenezer Church's, Stokes Co., N.C., on the 14th and 15th of September, 1884.

Utah Elders present: Charles M. Nokes, President of North Carolina Conference; Jos. Belknap, Alexander Bills, Amos Cook, E. G. Farmer, C. F. Christianson, John S. Willie, Alma U. Hobson, C. P. Ostler, B. F. McKinney, W. T. Garner and John E. Roueche.

Prest. C. M. Nokes presided.
Conference convened at 10 o'clock a.m.

Prest. C. M. Nokes made appropriate opening remarks.

Elder Amos Cook spoke at some length upon the principles of faith, repentance, baptism for the remission of sins and laying on of hands for the gift of the Holy Ghost.

Brother Joseph Belnap reported his field; said he had labored since last conference in Carroll, Patrick and Grayson counties of Virginia; made a great many friends, also baptized a great many as well as blessed a number of children. Could hardly fill the demand of the people for holding meetings.

Brother C. F. Christensen reported his field. He had labored since last conference in Mitchell and Yancey counties, N.C., also in the edge of Tennessee. Had been treated very kindly as a general thing, but had received some persecution, most of which had come from the ecclesiastical authorities. Where they had received the greatest persecution they had done the most good. Had witnessed some remarkable cases of healing.

Brother E. G. Farmer reported the Wilkes County field. Had made many friends; always had been provided for. Had received some persecution; had met with some success, and been instrumental in bringing some into the fold of Christ. Bore his testimony.

Conference was adjourned till 10 o'clock a.m. to-morrow. Notice was given that the funeral sermon of Mr. L. A. King and his daughter Virginia Elizabeth would be preached on the morrow.

Nokes said: We have assembled to pay our last tribute of respect to John Quincy Adams King, son of Thomas B. and Elizabeth King, born Dec. 19, 1833, died Sept. 2, 1882, in Stokes County, N.C.; also Virginia Elizabeth King, daughter of John Q. A. and Charity King, born July 28th, 1864, died May 13, 1883, in Stokes County, N.C. He spoke at some length upon the plan of salvation which is prepared for those who pass away without the opportunity of embracing the gospel; also upon the resurrection.

Brother Alexander Bills reported his field. Had traveled in several counties since last conference. About the last of October was advised to travel in Burke County and open up a new field in the adjoining counties. Had received very poor encouragement, as he found but few who were willing to listen to the gospel. Bore his testimony to the truth of the gospel.

President C. M. Nokes, Alexander Bills and B. F. McKinney were honorably released to return home.

Brother Amos Cook was sustained as President of the North Carolina Conference.

WEEKS.—Brother Allen Weeks, husband of the late deceased Sarah Jane Weeks, passed peacefully away from this stage of action last Wednesday morning at 7 o'clock. He was the son of Benjamin and Hannah Weeks, was born in North Carolina, January 24th, 1813. He received the Gospel in 1838, passed through the persecutions with the Saints at Nauvoo and emigrated to Utah, and was captain of fifty across the plains. He was ordained Bishop of Cedar Valley in 1853. He proved a father to the people and was loved by all, until his health and eyes so failed him that he was honorably released. His two sons, Willie and Warren, aged 16 and 18 years, were murdered by the Indians while in the canyon after wood. When the father found them brutally butchered, scalped, limbed and their hearts entirely gone, he sought the Lord to comfort him in his great griefs. He was the father of 14 children, of whom he has left but three, who are well respected. Though he has been an invalid for many years, and deprived of his eyesight, he has proved staunch and true to the principles of the Gospel.—COM.

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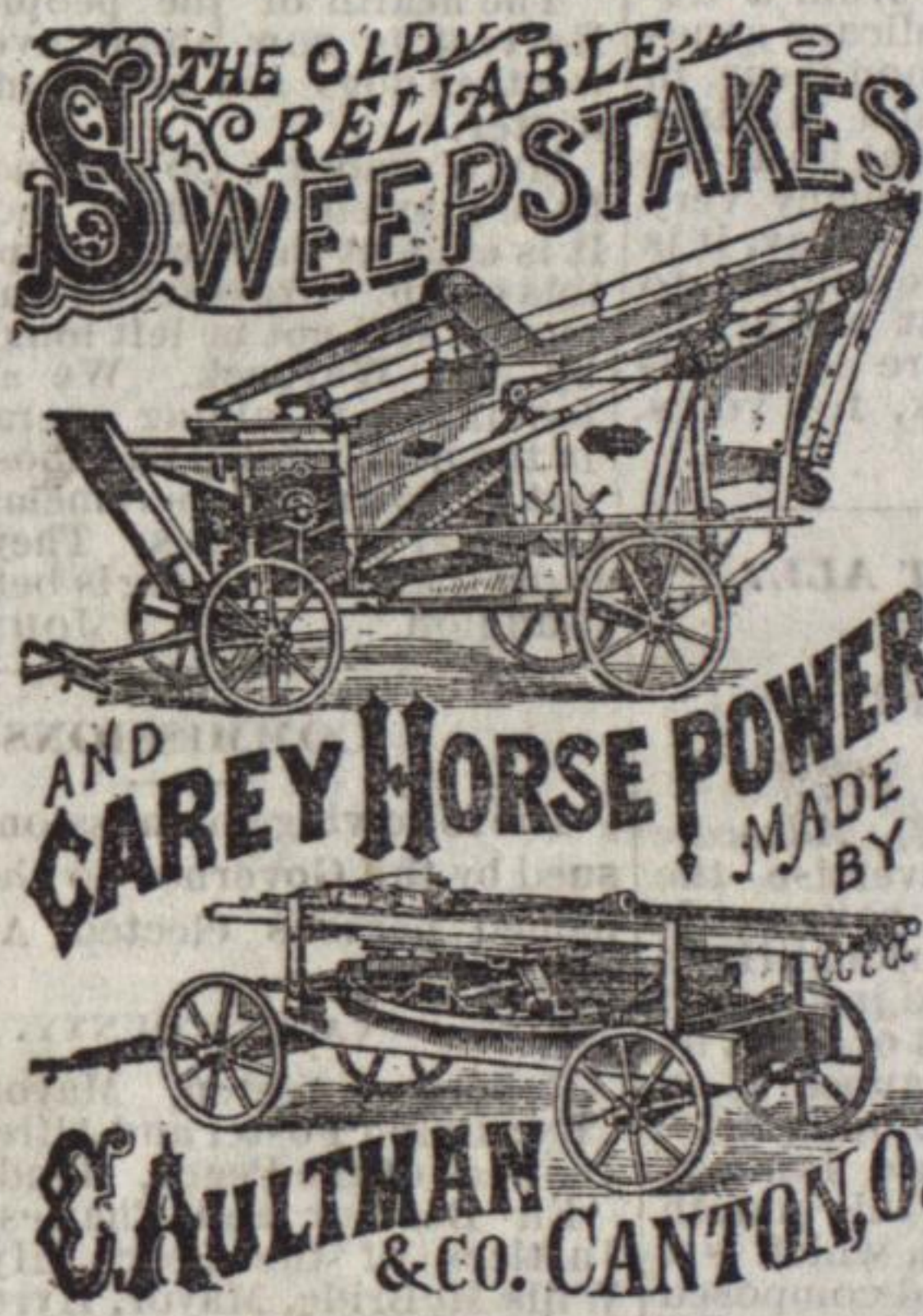
