HARRY BROWN'S BEST OF BRIGHAM YOUNG.

At President Taylor's office yesterday morning, we had the pleasure of looking at a fine plaster cast portrait bust of the late President Brigham Young, the work of Harry Brown, a young gentleman of Logan.
