

BOYS WORKING HARD FOR BOULDER TEAM

First Real Hard Scrimmage of the Season Took Place Last Night.

CAME EARLY IN NOVEMBER.

Colorado Huskies Are Also Looking Forward to the Struggle and Are Getting Ready.

At Cummings field Maddock is working hard with his eye on the Boulder team for an objective of the season. Last night the scrimmage was the first real hard one of the season, and made the men work considering their soft condition. Scrimmage was out of it on account of indisposition, and Idaho-Harris retired on account of a bruise. Of the new recruits to the team Brock, the halfback of last year, who proved himself a dogged player, is the missing man in the back field. Although Peterson may be used on offense work as a halfback in addition to Russell and Benton, who now comprise the back field. Home is out in the togs, but he is too new at the game yet to warrant a forecast of his possibilities.

BOULDER HARD AT WORK.
The condition in Boulder is of great interest to the local enthusiasts. That their team is to be an excellent one is assumed. The following estimate is made by a writer for the Denver Post:

The close of the second week of training has seen the sound of the University of Colorado to be in far better trim than any of the coaches had expected. The boys are fast, round, and in excellent shape, while the old ones are showing signs of their form of former years. The new recruits are being trained in the best manner. Many of the new men who at the beginning of the week were thought to be wind and not in particularly good form have developed a great deal during the last four or five days.

The very hardest work is being insisted upon by both the coaches and the players. The team is now in excellent condition. The first and second teams went through a hard kicking game, in which the second team showed up in excellent form against the older men.

The defense that Coach Klenholtz has worked up is one of the strongest that the university has had in some years, and when the green men become surer of themselves it will give them hard problems for the teams against which the university will play this year. Coach Klenholtz has every confidence in his players and thinks that without any doubt the team will prove a winning one. There will come two weeks before any game takes place.

The showing made by the men this week is very encouraging. Knowledge and teamwork at center are doing excellent work. The new candidates for quarter are also doing good work. They are playing low and changing the line in great style. Barr, Jordan, Sutton, Wilson and Warner are the men who are being looked upon as candidates and the men who make good will have strong competition. The line men trying out for the tackle are Weiler, Heller and Sigmond. Thatcher and Randall are members of last year's squad. The candidates for quarter are numerous, but the coaches have not yet developed a man who they think is a star by any means. Doolittle, Wilson, Miller, Reed and Pugh are all trying out for the position and are showing various degrees of improvement.

The university is again up against the prospect of a shortage of good material for the field. There are but few men out on the field who have shown any particular ability. To this line, the coaches are looking. Christensen, Pray and Pratt and Hoyt. All the men will have to develop greater ability before they can be considered efficient.

There is an abundance of good material trying out for the back field. Most of the men are old and experienced players, having been on the team before. Of these, Rodgers, Quinn, Thomas, Salisbury and Hoyt are all old men. Moore and Pugh are new. Moore seems to promise to be a star in the future. The coaches are looking for a player to develop into a star, who will be interchangeable with the ends, so as to relieve the back field as much as possible.

OFFICIAL CALL

For Republican Primaries And Conventions.

The Republican electors of Salt Lake City, Utah will meet in their respective election districts on Wednesday, Sept. 27, 1905, at 8 o'clock p. m. for the purpose of electing delegates to the Republican city convention, which will be held at the Salt Lake Theatre on Oct. 1, 1905, at 9:30 a. m. Said city convention will select candidates for each of the following city officers, to wit: Mayor, recorder, attorney, auditor and treasurer. The delegates to this convention are apportioned among the various election districts as follows:

The Republican electors in the Ninety-sixth district will attend primaries in the Thirtieth and Fourteenth districts, as they did prior to the organization of the Ninety-sixth district.

The city district chairman in each district will select the place for holding the primary in his district. He should report the same to the secretary of the Republican city committee at the earliest possible date.

In each district a chairman and district committee should be selected to represent the Republican party in that district during the ensuing campaign.

The delegates to this city convention shall also act as delegates to the municipal ward convention to be held in the respective municipal wards on Friday, Sept. 29, 1905, at 8 p. m.

In each district a chairman and district committee should be selected to represent the Republican party in that district during the ensuing campaign.

Each municipal ward convention beside nominating one candidate for the city council long term, shall also nominate one candidate for the city council short term.

The primaries shall be conducted as follows: The chairman in each district shall appoint three judges, one of whom shall take down the name and address of all persons voting. All voting shall be by ballot, the polls shall be open from 8 to 3 p. m. Only Republicans residing in the districts shall be allowed to vote.
