LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Thermometer 64° in the shade at one o'clock to-day.

"EAST AND WEST."—This great sensation drama drew a large audience to the Theatre last night, and appeared to give very great satisfaction. The various characters were well personified, and the machinery—which is very intricate, and well worth seeing—worked most smoothly. The scenery, which is in operation, and the elevated railway, all being especially done up in the most sensational manner, will be repeated to-night.

In Town.—Hon. Chas. E. Jones of Melbourne, Australia, formerly one of the principal members of the government of Melbourne, having been the head of five separate departments thereof, including the Railway System of the Colony, and Public Works, is now in this city. Mr. Jones has acquired fame as a lecturer and lecturer, and has recently been on a lecturing tour in California, the press there speaking of him in this respect, in terms of the most unqualified praise. His subjects only, but includes very many, all of a literary and intellectual character, most of them, upon the history of the world, and events in modern European history. Y., who himself cherishes very pleasant recollections of his visit to this city. They will probably leave for California to-morrow.

Police.—Benjamin Neely was fined this morning by Justice Clinton ten dollars for drunkenness and disturbing the peace; fifteen dollars for drawing a pistol on "Sam," the tailor in Truxel's billiard saloon last night; also twenty-five dollars for assaulting the police with a knife, all of which he paid.

Fanny Lincoln.—A little girl 10 years old, of pleasing appearance, who says her name is Fanny Lincoln, and that she has lived in Logan, Cache Co., where her father and mother both died within the last six months, was found by the police at the R. R. Depot this morning, trying to obtain a passage to Spanish Fork, where she has an uncle living, by the name of Darger.

It is six weeks since her mother died, when she, being without father or mother, was taken by one James Johnson and his wife, who took care of her until within a week, when the Johnsons concluded to go East, and she was obliged to seek another home. She obtained a passage with a gentleman coming with a horse team to Ogden, where another gentleman paid her passage to this city. She arrived here three days ago, and has since lived with some persons in the old market. She is a red-headed girl, with green braids over it.

EASTERN DISPATCHES.

BALTIMORE, Md., 24.—At the election for councilmen yesterday, the vote was small. The Democrats elected 17, the Republicans three, Republican gain two.

CHICAGO, 24.—Rev. Dr. Fowler, the well known pastor of the century Methodist church in this city, was yesterday elected president of the western University at Evanston, Ill.

The rapid spread of the Canadian horse disease and its appearance here, is causing serious apprehension as to the effect on business of the north. The effect will be very disastrous. The owners of large stables have already taken precautionary measures to prevent its appearance among their horses, by fumigating and disinfecting their stables, and taking extra care of their horses. The veterinary surgeon of the American Express Company has gone to Detroit and Toronto to investigate the best method for the treatment of the disease.

BOSTON, 24.—The Chinese testimonial entertainment at the Coliseum, last night, was a success, notwithstanding the storm.

NEW YORK, 24.—The horse disease is spreading rapidly, and it is feared that from eight to ten thousand horses in all are suffering in various stages of the malady. It is feared that a serious interruption to travel and traffic will result. Hundreds of the infected horses were in the streets yesterday. About 150 cars in all have been taken out of the different street car lines, and some forty stages were withdrawn yesterday. Alarming stories are circulated that the disease has been transmitted to men, but there appears to be no foundation for the rumors. Many have been thought to be diseased, but have disappeared entirely. No fatal cases are yet reported.

RECAPITULATION.—The horse disease is worse than ever; there are no horses in the streets. The storekeepers are delivering their goods to their customers. Business is suspended. The animals attacked took the disease from 15 to 30 days before it was discovered. A few fatal cases are reported.

the morning. The disease has appeared among the horses. There is great difficulty in procuring conveyances for funerals.

CINCINNATI, O., 24.—The flouring mill of Quincy & Burtway, at Rockfield, Ind., was burned this morning, losing by the destruction of the building, \$30,000, no insurance. A large amount of stock consumed, loss not stated.

ST. LOUIS, 24.—The murderer of conductor Percy at Marshfield, Missour, on Tuesday night, has been captured and is now in the Webster county jail.

NEW YORK, 24.—The trial of Mayor Storr testified to the Mayor's signature being affixed to certain bills which passed the Board of Aldermen. The witness gave a detailed account of the bill routine. Before a warrant was drawn for their payment the bills were examined by both parties, and the Mayor there were on an average a thousand bills per month during May, June and July 1872. Bills of forty or fifty thousand dollars were not unusual.

The prosecution here strenuously objected to the witness being asked if he knew whether the members of the present Board of Aldermen personally examined into the bills, and the ground of objection being that if others neglected their duty, it was no defense in the case.

FOXBORO, 24.—Premier Blake and Treasurer McKenney have returned to St. Paul, Minn., to attend to their duties in Parliament. The Lieut. Governor has sent for vice-chancellor Mowatt to form a new government. Mowatt has resigned his office and has accepted the task. The new ministry will be shortly announced.

Advices from Fort Garry state that a large body of Sioux Indians are reported to have been seen on the Red River. It was not understood whether they were friendly or otherwise. Some movement of the Sioux is reported. Lake Chippewas against the boundary commission, but as the commission has American troops as an escort, there was not likely to be much trouble.

NEW YORK, 24.—The horse disease has appeared here, and there have been three deaths.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, 24.—The coal dealers of Cardiff have reduced the price of coal, to steamers, six shillings per ton, fearing a American competition.

MONACO, 23.—Railway travel between here and Geneva is interrupted by the breaking of two bridges.

PARIS, 23.—The Garonne has evacuated Rheims. A French garrison marched in to-day, amid great rejoicing.

PARIS, 24.—Roussel, a prominent Communist, has been found guilty of the charges against him, and sentenced to death.

Neophyte Gautier, the poet, novelist and critic, died yesterday.

The evacuation of the department of the Marne and Upper Marne by the Germans is completed.

Several alarming reports of disastrous inundations on each bank of the river Po have reached Rome. No details are given. The minister of public works has gone to the scene of the flood.
