Some concern has been felt over the decision of Secy, of the Navy Meteair that riflemen with the fleet on the Pacific coast should not be sent east to compete for places on the naval team, which will shoot in the national matches at Camp Perry in August, Last year the naval team carried off the prize, and it was felt that it would be weakened beyond hope by the absence of those members now with the fleet on its world-tour. Competitors who have been counting on this weakness will find themselves mistaken. NEW TESTS FOR AMERICAN WARSHIPS

Norfolk, Va., May 25 .- The United States monitor Florida sailed from the Norfolk navy yard today for Hampton Roads preparatory to the gunners' tests in which the Florida is to serve as a targetship. The Florida is preceded from the yard by the monitor Arkansas and torpedo boat Morris, which will participate in the tests. These tests will begin Wednesday on the old southern drill grounds in Lower Chesapeake bay. The tugs Mohawk and Rocket have been detached from the navy yard for the use of newspaper correspondents and others designated by the secretary of the navy. In the tower built on the Monitor for the tests have been placed "dummy" men who will act as targets for sharp shooting from the other vessels. The Florida presents a unique appearance.

It is the first time in the history of the American navy that tests such as this vessel is to be subjected to have ever been attempted. The monitor will be fired upon as if she was a real enemy of war, this being for the purpose of ascertaining what position the formidableness of the monitor type of ship occupies.

The torpedoes to be shot at the Florida by the Morris will be repelled by a torpedo net about the monitor below her water line. This will be the first test of the torpedo net by the American havy. Arkansas and torpedo boat Morris,

"UNCLE BILLY" HAMILTON.

Indian Fighter and Companion of James Bridger Dead.

Butte, Mont., May 25 .- A Miner dispatch from Billings tells of the death here Sunday night of William T. Hamilton ,aged 86, well known throughout the state as "Uncle Billy," and probably the greatest Indian fighter and Indian sign reader and talker the west has ever produced. Years before "Buffalo Bill" Cody was born, Hamilton was lighting Indians on the plains ton was fighting Indians on the plains and in the Rocky mountains. He was the companion of James Bridger and John Bozeman, after whom the town of Bozeman was named. Hamilton was one of the first to build a cabin in Missoula, he having camped on the site of the city long before there were any habitations there. He was a member of a party that penetrated Newada and fought several notable battles there. He was one of Gen. Custer's noted

He was one of Gen. Custer's noted scouts, escaping massacre by reason of being with the main body at the time of the Little Big Horn battle. He saw the great cliff on the shores of Flathead lake on which are painted hundreds of Indian signs. These he read with ease. Many years later, at the request of thet Smithsonian institution, he went to Washington, D. C., where he interpreted these pictures, Five years ago Mr. Hamilton published a brief account of his life called "My Sixty Years on the Plains." This forms one of the most interesting chapters in the history of the west. ters in the history of the west

SUIT TO DISPOSSESS SOUTHERN PACIFIC OF LAND

Washington, May 25.—B. O. Townsend, a special attorney in the department of justice, will leave here tomorrow for Portland, Or., where he shortly will institute legal proceedings on behalf of the government to dispossess the Southern Pacific of land in western Oregon, valued at \$3,500,000, and to secure a decree annulling the grant and restoring the lands to the public domain. public domain.

The lands in question were given to the old Southern Pacific several decades ago to induce the construction of railroad lines. The roads were built, but it is charged that the holders of the land grant have failed to live up to other parts of the obligation to the government.
