LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THE RETURN OF THE PRESIDENT AND PARTY.—President Young and party reached this city at 2 o'clock, from their northern trip. The members of the party were all well. Flags were flying from the principal business places in the town, in honor of the President's return.

DELAY.—The delay in our delivery to-day was unavoidable, having been caused by a breakage in the press.

THEATRE.—A performance will be given at the Theatre on Saturday evening, when an excellent bill will be presented. The serio-comic drama, "Love and the Pride of Birth," will be the first piece introduced, after which will be performed "The Village Ghost," a pantomimic sketch. The whole to conclude with the laughable farce, "Domestic Troubles." Miss Nellie Colebrook, Messrs. D. McKenzie, P. Margretts, and H. K. Whitney will take part in the performances, it being the first appearance on the boards, of the last named gentleman, for four years. We hope to see the house well filled on the occasion, as the variety bill and the known ability of the performers, promise an entertainment more than usually attractive.

ACCIDENT.—Just before going to press, this afternoon, we learned that Henry Hall, a boy in the employ of President D. H. Wells, was kicked in the breast by a horse. Medical assistance was at once called in, when it was discovered that, although severely bruised, he had not sustained any injury of a dangerous nature.

MORE ADDITIONS.—The following have been recently added to the constantly increasing specimens of reptiles &c., at the menagerie: a mountain alligator, a horned toad and a large variety of lizards; all of which were obtained from St. George.

SCORCHING.—Nearly every body is complaining of the hot weather. The people here have, however, comparatively small cause for complaint as it will be seen, by reference to to-day's dispatches, that, in some parts east of us, the thermometer ranges from 90 to 96 in the shade.

TIMPANOGS BRANCH OF THE DESERET UNIVERSITY.—Elder Robert L. Campbell, Secretary of the Regency of the Deseret University, left this city for Provo last Saturday, to visit and inspect the Timpanogs branch of the Deseret University, at Provo. He returned to this city yesterday morning, and gives a very good report of the Provo college. The building in which the college is held is the best, used for school purposes, in the Territory. The pupils in the institution, at the present time number over a hundred, which for this season of the year, when so many youngsters are kept from school to do summer work, is a very large number. The advanced scholars are not very numerous, but they are increasing.

The order observed and maintained among the pupils is second to no institution in the Territory. A sub-regency has been appointed, of which Elder Myron Tanner is chairman, and he attends frequently and gives much countenance to the institution. Secretary Campbell says he spent two days at the institution and was highly pleased with what he saw there, and felt satisfied that the day has dawned for educational advancement in Provo.

FRATERNAL.—We had a visit this morning from a brother of the quill, Joseph Elboeck, Esq., editor and proprietor of the Clayton County Journal, the oldest paper in northern Iowa. Mr. Elboeck is en route for the Pacific Coast, and expects to resume his journey to-morrow.

A NEW SALT LAKE DISCOVERED.—A late number of the Los Angeles (Cal.) News says: "One of the exploring party alluded to elsewhere, tells of a salt lake located in the mountains of Lower California, which is some twenty or thirty miles long and half as many broad. It has no apparent inlet or outlet. When several miles distant, the nostrils of the approaching party were filled with odors which were certainly not those from 'Araby blest.' Arriving at the shores of the lake the cause lay revealed. The waters for a long distance from the shore were very shallow. A storm of wind, evidently, had driven vast shoals of fish on shore, where they were left to decompose beneath the broiling sun, creating a horrible stench. The fish resembles the Eastern 'lunker,' and were from one foot to eighteen inches in length. The waters of the lake appeared alive with living finny occupants."
