#### RAILROAD DIFFICULTIES IN COURT

W. could not use it, and ditched a car at that point and placed

#### UTAH DIVORCE QUESTION Is Cause of Action Limited to Permanent Insanity?-News Notes.

Special Correspondence. Provo, April 24.—A demurrer to the complaint in the divorce suit of Florence Sjostedt vs Oliver J. Sjostedt, on the grounds that it did not state facts ufficient to constitute a cause of action has argued Saturday in the Fourth district court, and taken under advise-men. The complaint alleges cruelty as a ground for divorce, and Attorney Bagley for defendant, takes the position that chapter 43, session laws of 1903. which makes permanent insanity ground for divorce, repeals section 1208 of the revised statutes of 1898, which t seeks to amend by adding permanen neanity as one of the grounds fo which a divorce may be obtained, and that, therefore, permanent insanity is the only ground on which divorce may

be obtained in this state.

Horses were quickly hitched to plows, and urged along the fire guards, which were plowed between the fire and the coal town. The flames F. A. RICHARDSON. the fire and the coal town. The flames leaped over the fire guard in many places, but the crowds of miners, who left their work to fight the flames, succeeded in preventing the fire burning the town. The fire soon veered away to the south, where the farmers in that direction gave battle. All day long the excitement kept up. Two wagons, a stack of hay and some other losses resulted from the fire. The people in southern Alberta have been frequently warned to plow fire guards around their possessions, and thus prevent trouble.
