AT THE GRAND GULCH. Body of Copper Ore Running 35 Per Cent Found in South Drift.

Word has been received by Thomas W. Jennings from the Grand Guich mine in northern Arizona that high grade copper ore has been encountered in the south drift on the 100-foot level. For the past 35 feet on this level, 10 or 15 per cent copper ore has been encountered, but this has now opened out into a body of ore running 35 per cent. The east and west drifts are also said to be looking well. to be looking well.

COLUMBIA COPPER CO. Stockholders Meet Today and Reduce the Capitalization.

The stockholders of the Columbia Copper Mining Company, of Blingham, met today and cut down the capitalization from \$1,500,000 to \$75,000, by reducing the par value of the shares from \$5 to \$5 cents each






