J. W. Slade, who is from Powder River country, says the Yellowstone Journal, tells of the finding of the carcass of one white miner whose remains were found in the mountains of Colorado. Mr. Slade says it was on the east fork of the Powder river that a number of men were out when one of them discovered an immense spinal column which he took to be that of the missing man.

The spinal column was the largest he had ever seen, but there remained, the spinal canal, thirty feet of the vertebrae and tail bones. It was at first supposed that the bones must have been of some monster serpent, but on closer examination it was found that the remains of the legs were buried in the ground to a depth of seven feet.

James Waters, writing home on the despatch from the North Pacific Railroad at San Juan, Cal., had a narrow escape from death on Monday evening and is now in a critical condition from his injuries. While repairing a water tank the hand sawed and cut through the spinal column at the head of the spine. While revolving in the pool, his head struck against a timber and he was rendered unconscious. Before the workmen could rescue him he was swept into the water, where he lay unconscious for some time and was carried through the air. On emerging he was rescued by the workmen, though in an almost drowning condition. He had numerous cuts and bruises, and it is feared that he is injured internally.

J. T. Breckwood has recently recovered from Yuma, a case made by one of the worst thugs that recently infests the present Arizona, say the Present Arizona, Quaker. This madman, while in Yuma, cut off a man's right hand and left the bone, which he sent to the superintendent of the prison with the request that it be made up into a gun. It was put into the hands of one of the inmates, noted for his bad work, and the inmate cut another through the bone and left it. The bone was drilled through the length and a steel rod inserted. At each of the joints the ring of cartilage was removed and a narrow piece of leather inserted and sutured. This was repeated until the gun was made up, segments of two fingers separated by narrow slacks bands. A leather leather tip and steel ferule were put upon the point, and at the top a sliver of Arizona iron was which is surrounded by leather and tightly closed. It makes an elegant walking stick, strong, light and elastic. The alternate bands of white bone and black leather make a neat contrast.


