DR. Nansen Gets a Gold Medal.

Swedenborgians in America and England have subscribed \$5,000 toward a Swedenborgian memorial in Stockholm. The money will probably be used to aid the recently established Swedenborgian church and provide a library of the numerous writings of a teacher.

One hundred and fifty emigrants from Stockholm left April 13 for the British Isles. A great number of people had assembled on the quay to bid them adieu to the distant land.

The Democratic leaders are agitating for a reduction of taxes and laborers during harvest time, so that the most efficient means of bringing the laborers to term.

Eleven bakery firms of Stockholm have suspended business during the winter, twelve months of the year.

The export of corn has considerably increased, and tax, while imports have materially decreased.

A wife killer named August Johnson, who on the 11th of March last finally stoned his wife, has been sentenced to seven years in the penitentiary.

A stockholder has calculated that he will strike with his wife unless she earn a pittance of \$5 each a day.

A strike of 4,000 miners in the district of Norberg has been amicably settled. The Salvation Army has sent delegates to advocate the accepted compromise, but they arrived too late.

Sixty-four hundred emigrants are expected to leave Helsingfors June 1 for the British Isles to become agricultural laborers.

Colonel P. Melin has sent \$2000 to the Museum of Gothenburg to procure plaster copies of antique statues.

A farmer, John Alfred Karlsson, from Skaraborg, was captured on board a steamer at New York, May 1, for an American, making his escape after committing a forgery on the bank of Malmö for \$750.

A unique collection of 942 square Swedish coins has been made by Mr. G. Ovall, a druggist of Skövde.

Another remarkable auction of pictures recently taken place in the city of Lund, Sweden. Of the 1,000 less than 67 persons, mostly old and decrepit, were knocked down by the hammer to be maintained each for less than \$20 a piece a year.

Seventy per cent of the youths of western Olandskrona have emigrated to America, for the reason that there is one in ten who has no cultural districts in Sweden. There must be something radically wrong in the social condition of a people that causes them to leave the land. The open cases in Sweden are generally only crudely smodish to working people.

An emigrant, who has been nine years in America and is at present paying a visit to his native home near Uddevalla, was recently seized by the military authorities and compelled to serve as a parish-knife-washer of his parish-knife-washer of the informants, the authorities.

The Dowager Countess von Koch, of Oland, presented thirty of her dependents with savings bank accounts, each containing from \$3 to \$120, according to the length of time they have been in her service. She is the only woman long acknowledged as the most favorable dame of the Swedish aristocracy. No blues ridge.

A "Swedish brigand" has been organized by the Salvation Army in Ystad, for the purpose of carrying the war into the heart of the enemy, in the dress of militia.

Karl Holmqvist, a workman who has been employed for fifty years at the old tobacco factory at Ystad, has been awarded a pension by his employer for long and faithful service, amounting to \$100 a year, which does not rise to quite \$1 a week, by way of reward.

A man who modestly desires to remain unknown has sent \$300 to the fund for aged servants.

Several small farmers have left their homes to dissolution, not being able to find a purchaser or lesseeholder, and emigrated to America.

In Dr. Nansen, the eminent Arctic explorer, has received the Victoria gold medal in England, awarded to him as reward of his being the first man who crossed the icecap of the island of Greenland. Dr. Nansen will be seen

concerned in his pending exploration of the North Pole by his old and valued comrade Captain Otto Sverdrup.

FINLAND.
