Fourth District Court.

There was a Children's hearing case before the court which occupied much of the time yesterday. Ring King was charged with having committed highway robbery. His victim was said to be Lee King, a Chinese gardener. The offense was stated to have been committed November 22nd, near the Ogden River bridge. The complaint charged defendant with robbing King of \$125, while the defendant maintained it was a personal encounter and that the money was lost in the struggle.

The testimony given went to show in a very conclusive manner that King's version of the affair was correct, and that he was innocent of robbery. The jury, according to the judge's instructions, brought in a verdict of not guilty. Great excitement prevailed among the Chinese of Ogden over the case, and they attended court to full tide.

All the defendants in the case of the Pacific Coast Road and Investment company, pleaded not guilty to the charge of violating the great laws and their case will be heard on Friday, December 15th.

A. H. Nelson, charged with embezzlement, pleaded not guilty, and will have a hearing on Thursday, the 14th inst.

Charles Douglas was arraigned on a charge of larceny, pleaded not guilty, and his case will have a further hearing today.

The case of M. A. Moffat, charged with violating the U. S. postal laws, was continued for the term.

County Court.

The Weber county court met yesterday in regular session, with all the members present.

There is a vacancy in the examining board, and County Superintendent Mc. Hall asked that it be filled. The matter was referred for a week.

Thomas W. Collins asked to be made night watchman of the county jail, but no action was taken.
