CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

15th Amendment ratified by the requisite number of States—Fitz-John Porter's case discussed—Lord's Prayer in 100 languages.

Williams introduced a joint resolution declaring the ratification of the 15th Amendment by the requisite number of States; referred to the judiciary committee.

Fenton introduced a bill for the establishment of a line of American mail and passenger steamships between New York and the Scandinavian ports.

Chandler offered a resolution requesting the President to communicate any recent correspondence relative to the case of Fitz-John Porter. Chandler proceeded to review the facts in the case in which Porter was court-martialed, declaring that Porter was faithful to Pope and treacherous to the Government.

Wilson complimented Porter as an accomplished, able general, commanding the best corps of the best army of the country, who had rendered great service to the country in former battles; while he did not see how a court-martial, with that evidence before them, could have returned any other verdict. He thought, on the statement that new evidence had been discovered that would explain and perhaps amply justify Porter's action, he should have a new trial. He felt that any man who had stood on the battle field in the rebellion and given aid to his country should be righted if he had been wronged.

Chandler withdrew the resolution. Patterson, from the committee on retrenchment, reported a bill to abolish the Freedmen's Bureau and to provide for the Bureau of Education.

Howard introduced a bill to provide a territorial government for Alaska.

The Vice President announced that he was compelled to be absent one week and that Senator Anthony had been deputed to preside temporarily.

Several bills from the committee on commerce were passed.

Morrill, of Maine, from the conference committee on the bill supplying the deficiency in the appropriation for the naval service, made a report fixing the whole amount of the appropriations at \$2,000,000, which was concurred in.

Sumner announced that he had received, for presentation to the Senate, a beautiful volume containing the Lord's Prayer in a hundred different languages. He moved that it be received and deposited in the Congressional Library; agreed to.

Wilson introduced a joint resolution declaring that no speech, not actually delivered in Congress, should be printed in the Globe, which was passed.

A bill for the construction of a New York and Washington air-line railroad was taken up, and pending its discussion the Senate went into executive session and soon after adjourned.

HOUSE.
Expulsion of a Vandal Number Likely.

Logan, of the military committee, made a report of the case of Whittemore for selling cadet appointments and recommended his expulsion. The clerk read the testimony in the case and the exculpatory statements of Whittemore. The evidence states that Whittemore received between eight and eleven hundred dollars for military, and fifteen hundred for naval cadships. He admits being presented with five hundred dollars in each case; but states that in one instance it was accepted for distribution among the poor of his district. In the other cases it was used for political purposes. A discussion ensued, the point in question being the propriety of allowing Whittemore time to make a defense and have the evidence printed. Logan finally agreed and the House unanimously acquiesced to let the matter lie over till Wednesday, when Whittemore is to appear at the bar.

NEW YORK.
Glad to get Home—General Holiday—Importers Arrived—Suspend Payment—Murder Trial—Seward's Return—Graveyard Burned—Washington's Birthday—\$25,000 Fire.

NEW YORK.—A steamer from Brazil brought back to this country, yesterday, a cargo of ex-Confederates who went after the close of the war to settle in Brazil after suffering terrible privations they were shipped home by the Imperial government. Several companies of southern emigrants, who located in other parts of Brazil, are doing well and will remain.

To-day is observed, generally, as a holiday: the banks and courts are closed and business generally suspended. The 11th regiment will parade also the remaining veterans of 1812. Appropriate exercises will be held in Trinity Church.

Count Otto Von Balow, a bogus Prussian Count, and his cousin, Count Otto, were arrested in marrying a young rich woman, the daughter of a respected citizen at Elizabeth, N. J., and winding the family out of some \$10,000 were arrested yesterday, and are now confined in jail to await examination.

The iron works at Newburg, N. Y., have suspended payment; the liabilities of the company is stated at about \$95,000. It is also stated that the assets, if sufficient time be allowed for their conversion, will more than cover this amount. The concern, during the war, was one of the largest in the country, employing at one time 1,000 men. The property is owned by Homer Ramsdell, one of the directors of the Erie.

Assassin Arrested.

HAVANA.—Cabrena, a Cuban, connected with the assassination of Greenwald, was arrested yesterday.

FRANCE.
How to testify American Gratitude to France.

PARIS.—The La Patrie has an editorial, suggested by the birth day of Washington, which says that it is as much a day of rejoicing for France as it is for the United States. It refers to the ser-

The trial of Reynolds, the murderer of Townsend, commenced to-day. In addressing the jury, District Attorney Garvin, said: "We are standing in an atmosphere epidemic with crime, in city or country; no one is free from the knife of the assassin or from the violence of the highwayman," and they should let their verdict attest that murder shall be punished.

The common council tendered the hospitality of the city to W. H. Seward on his return to the United States. The extensive graperies and hot-houses belonging to George Jones, of Morrisania, were destroyed by an incendiary fire, to-day; loss \$25,000, partly insured.

NEW YORK, 22.—Business is entirely suspended to-day; Washington's birthday is more generally observed than ever before. Appropriate celebrations are reported from Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington, Boston, Providence and elsewhere.

A fire last night damaged the varnish establishment of Smith, Baldwin & Company, 25th St., to the amount of \$15,000; also the school furniture factory of Kehr, Keimer & Company, to the amount of \$30,000.

WASHINGTON.
Supreme Court Decision Relative to Indiana Divorces.

WASHINGTON.—The Supreme Court of the United States, to-day, in a case involving the validity of a divorce granted in Indiana, held that, being valid by the law of that State, under the Constitution of the U. S., it must prevail in every other portion of the country.

PENNSYLVANIA.
A Severe Thawing Gas Explosion.

PHILADELPHIA, 21.—During an exhibition of dissolving views, at the Horticultural Hall, this evening, an explosion of the gas used for the exhibition occurred, shattering fourteen windows and causing a great panic and the injury of some of the audience.

CALIFORNIA.
Heavy Rains—The Urso Concert.

SAN FRANCISCO, 21.—Heavy rains continue to prevail throughout the entire State.

The hotels are crowded with people from the interior to attend the Camilla Urso festival. The banks and principal business houses will be closed for the afternoon concerts, and the board of brokers hold only one daily session. The trustees of the Mercantile Library Association have decided to tender to Camilla Urso a grand complimentary ball on the 25th instant, in acknowledgment of services rendered to the Association.

MARYLAND.
Seward and party at Baltimore—Coldest Weather.

BAITIMORE.—Gov. Seward and party arrived this afternoon in the steamer Cuba from Havana. The ex-Secretary is in excellent health and spirits.

This is the coldest day of the season.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.
A \$100,000 Fire.

The flannel mill of Austin & Taylor, at North Salem, N. H., was destroyed by fire on Saturday; loss \$100,000; insurance \$44,000.

FOREIGN NEWS.

CREAT BRITAIN.
Light House Carried Away—Cold Weather—A Bishop Dead—Reduction of the British Army—Worthy of Imitation.

LONDON.—The Fleetwood lighthouse was literally carried away last night by a ship, which dashed against it during the gale.

Letters from Rome say that an early adjournment of the Council is probable.

The weather is extremely cold; ice obstructs navigation on the Thames.

LONDON, 22.—The Pacific Steam Navigation Co., have planned for semi-monthly steamers to run from Panama to Liverpool, by way of the Straits of Magellan.

The Right Rev. Ashborn Turner, Bishop of Chichester, died yesterday, aged 84 years.

An English engineer has obtained a contract to build three hundred miles of railroad in Japan.

Lord Derby has formally declined the leadership of the House of Lords, which was tendered him by the conservative peers.

The British army estimates announce a reduction of twelve thousand five hundred men.

In view of the many startling accidents caused by petroleum, a law is projected for subjecting it to still severer tests, which will soon be brought before Parliament, looking to this end.

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vice rendered America by La Fayette, and concludes by saying that the Americans can best show their gratitude to France by placing at public meetings, side by side, the busts of Washington and Napoleon III.

In the Corps Legislatif, Jules Favre moved his interpellation of the ministry on their domestic policy. He supported the motion with a vigorous speech. He alluded to the government's recent popular troubles, and severely denounced the arrest of Rochefort and the attempt to mislead the public mind by the pretended existence of a conspiracy. He demanded the dissolution of the Chambers, and said the majority here was not of motions but of prefects. If the ministry intended to be truly liberal he would support them, though not with implicit confidence; but if they continued to be an instrument for personal power, he would oppose them. He accused the present majority of having voted for the Mexican expedition and of having thus squandered the finances.

Ex-Minister Finaud, made a reply, which the Journal calls weak and ineffective.

At a meeting of the shareholders of the French Cable Company, held in this city yesterday, an agreement was made with the Anglo-American, the Atlantic and New York, New Foundland and London Telegraph Companies for the working of the cables. The arrangement, looking to economy of expense and expedition of business, was unanimously approved, and the directors were authorized to arrange with the French government with regard to exclusive rights, so as to give a perfect reciprocity to the United States.

The preliminary examination of those persons arrested during the recent troubles has been held; 108 have been unconditionally discharged; 112 held to appear at court; 150 are to be kept under arrest for conspiracy against the State, and the life of the Emperor.
