
Ogden High School and All Hallows

## GREAT BATTLE WITH THE COLORADO RIVER.

Imperial Junction, Cal., Oct. 15.—Seldom has a more desperate battle with nature been waged than that for the turning of the Colorado river. When the Rock-wood gate went out last Thursday a great disappointment was occasioned, but the outlook is much brighter now. Yester-day the trestle below the gate was ro-paired, 20 cars of rock heing dumped as an experiment. This morning the rock was found in the same position, indicat-ing that the soil was firm enough to sup-port. Another trestle is being built beside the first, the rock being dumped between them, making a broad fill. It is now thought probable that the engineers will be able to fill the channel in 19 days, in-suring turning of the river by the end of the month. Every railroad quarry is supplying rock; some being hauled 300 miles. Every available boucht in the requisi-tion. At the same time track is being built to the river from the cement gate with the view of putting a dam across the ateman to divert it entirely through the cement gate if the other work fails.

JOY FOR POSTAL EMPLOYES. JOY FOR POSTAL EMPLOYES. New York, Oct. 15.—An important an-nouncement was made in this dity tonight by First Assistant Postmaser-General Frank H. Hitchcock, which will bring joy to the United States thousands postal employes. It was to the effect that in the postal estimate for the next fiscal year, to be submitted to the postofice de-partment to the treasury de-partment a radical change will be made in the recommendation effecting salaries. Betterment in pay involving the entire postal system of the United States will be advised, Mr. Hitchcock said. The statement followed a prolonged confer-ence today between Mr. Hitchcock and Postmaster William R. Willcox of New York.

Havana, Oct. 15 .-- The Liberals held the greatest political meeting ever witnessed in Cuba at the Payret theater ionight. Six thousand persons crowd-ed into the building, and an overflow meeting outside was attended by 2,000 more. Ex-Mayor O'Farrill presided. He was assisted by Jose Miguel Gomez, Alfredo Zayas and Senor Cas-ellanos. The tenor of the speeches was that what the American covernment

that what the American government had done in Cuba had no parallel in the world. Cuba should in every way follow the example of the United States and thus reach a position of inde-pendence and prosperity so that, in the course of time, except for the differ-ence in language and government Cuba ence in language and government, Cuba and the United States would be one. Juan Gualberto Gomez made an appeal Juan Gualberto Gomez made an appeal for a peaceful and united republic and the burying of all factional differences. He declared that the revolution had not been brought on by the Liberal party, and said the victory had been so great as to surprise even the Lib-erals themselves. American interven-tion, he declared, was not a result of the revolution, but had followed the ac-tion of ex-President Palma in appeal-ing for American aid. ### PROTECTION OF LANDSCAPES.

Although the movement for the protection of landscapes possessing great natural beauty, against defacement by the erection of factories and other industrial buildings, has only become an organized endeavor within the last few organized endeavor within the last few years, we are pleased to note that it is making rapid progress. Admittedly, the advance is not yet quick enough, for not a year goes by but that, either here or there some irrecoverable beau-ty spot is forever desucoyed, which, by a more judicious architectural style and arrangement of the industrial erection, might have been preserved intact. An almost incomprehensible shortsightedness of the auri sacra fames! We can live and thrive well enough, without this or that new in-dustrial building, but never without nature, which revives and rejuvenates us, which soothes, strengtheus and us, which soothes, strongthens and atimulates. Thus it unfortunately hap-pens that the efforts made to save the fails of the Rhine in the vicinity of Lauffen have miscarried, although Lauffen have miscarried, although conclusive arguments were brought forward to prove that the magnificent works which it is proposed to erect there could be laid out in such a way as not to interfere with the glorious scenery. But the dear old church-tower clique and the money-bag in-terests carried off the victory. The efforts on behalf of the Kufli met with more success. When it became known that a plan was on foot to construct a hotel on this historical spot, the cradle of the Swiss Confederacy, it was de-termined to mobilize the whole body of Swiss school children against this outrageous project; they collected a sum sufficient to buy up the proposed site of the hotel and thus nipped the plan in its incipiency. plan in its incipiency.

A similar thing occurred in Ole-vano, the charmingly situated little town in the Sabina hills near Rome, where the beautiful old oak grove of the Serpentara was to have been fellthe Serpentara was to have been fell-ed. The German artist settlement in Rome took a particular interest in this sylvan retreat, for they were long accustomed to hold their merry annual fete there. They have bought the Serpentara, and now the venerable grove is German state property, and, as such, secure against similar at-tempts at demolition. The movement has also several important successes to its credit in Germany itself. Mun-ich artists have rescued a neighboring part of the beautiful valley of the Isar from the builders, and thus secured for artists have rescaed a heighboring part of the beaultful valley of the Isar from the builders, and thus secured for Munich one of the lovellest spots in the vicinity of that city. Public opinion in Eisenach forced the town council to buy up the charming Jo-hannisthal in order to prevent its be-ing built upon. Similarly, the town of Elberfeld has purchased some lovely wooded spots in the neighborhood, to prevent them falling into the hands of the builders. The Prussian gov-ernment has rightly refused to sanc-tion the laying down of a cog-wheel railway through the dark, romanile Bodetal in the Harz district. The Prince of Schwartzburg acting in a similar spirit, steadfastly sets his face against any railway being constructed in the famous Schwartzatl, and



### SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY.

The commercial production of vegetable so phi powder and cakes, especially as a family industry, is the novel recom-mendation of a French chemist, after an investigation for the Aigerian govern-ment. The sopindus utilis, an imported tree, begins bearing at the age of six, and at its best may yield each year 200 pounds or more of a small fleshy fruit. The now abundant product has not been utilized, although similar to the soap sub-stitutes of China, Japan, India and the Antilies. The powdered fruit in water gave a soapy solution, which acted slow-y on account of containing a summy substance, but on roasting before grind-ing, the powder with warm water quick-excellent for washing, and was free fr. m risk of Injury to colored fabrics. The powder is easily made into cakes with water. Much more saponine was found than in the oriental inuit, with indica-tions of another constituent having the same soap-like properties as caponine.

The radium mines at Joachimeial, in Austria. recently supplied the Vienna Academy of Science with 10 tons of ura-nium ore, and this has yielded a quar-ter of a million dollars' worth of radium, which is to be used for research. The mines are being converted into a radium cure resort. A local laboratory for pro-ducing radium saits has been establish-ed, and the springs are serving as medi-cinal baths.

Of the ice-kept flowers of Vercler, a French florist. China peonles have been most enduring, some being faily pre-served after five months in the refrigera-tor. In his latest experiments, he has cut peonles with stems 16 inches long, put-ting them in water, trimming the ends every three weeks, and renewing water each month.

Castor cll powder, according to a new Holland patent, is prepared by pecipitat-ing the casein of a liter of skimined milk, then adding 5 milligrams of 10 per cent sodium carbonate solution and 40 prams of milk sugar, and incorporating 50 grams of castor oil. The mass is dried and pow-dered

Perhaps ho more singular feature of any planet is known than the great red spot that appeared on Jupiter in 1878. Round at first, this soon be-came elliptical, with a length of 25,000 miles and a breadth of 6,400, and the original deep red color has faded out in recent years. While the oval form has been kept, the spot has not been stationary. With the late breaking out of a conspleuous dcuble belt on Jupiter, the drift has greatly accel-erated, and the spot has moved west-ward 11,000 miles in three months.


# "VOLUNTEER" IS FOR SALE.
