### Last Night's Dispatches.

#### EASTERN.

Citizen Shot—Body Found—Missouri Congressional Convention.

PIERCE CITY, Mo., 16.—Dr. Holliday, a prominent citizen of Corsican, Barry County, was shot and killed by a worthless fellow named Bud Crawford, a few days ago. It is supposed Crawford was hired to assassinate him.

The body of James Woodman was found in a skiff near Sibley, Clay County, on Friday, with a bullet hole through his head.

The Democratic Congressional Convention sat at Kansas City on Friday and Saturday, took ninety-two ballots without result, and will meet again on Monday.

#### CANADA.

OTTAWA, 16.—At the Reformed Episcopal Council this evening Dean Croft, of British Columbia, was consecrated bishop of the Pacific Coast.

#### FOREIGN.

##### WALLACHIA.

BUCHAREST, 16.—The war minister has introduced a bill for the mobilization of the Rumanian army and calling out the reserves. The minister states that this is necessitated by the increasingly threatening aspect of the Servia-Turkish war.

##### FRANCE.

PARIS, 16.—The rumors that negotiations for an armistice between Turkey and Servia have already been opened are incorrect. The powers are, however, considering the conditions which should eventually form the basis of an armistice, which will be proposed when an opportunity offers.

##### GREAT BRITAIN.

LONDON, 16.—The Observer of today states that the rumor that the stolen painting of the Duchess of Devonshire, by Gainsborough, is recovered, is unfounded.

The Thunderer's Dead-List of War Reports.

Thirty-four of the crew of the Thunderer are dead.

The Standard's Vienna dispatch says the Turks have crossed the Timok at two places. Riots are feared at Belgrade in consequence of the government's refusal to allow the intervention of Russia in the Balkans, even by Russia. Prince Milan has written to the Czar, asking his intervention toward mitigation of hostilities, practiced by Russia. A Russian ambulance of sanitary corps is passing through Rumania. A force of 20,000 Turks leave Sofia on Sunday to relieve Nisch.

The Journal de St. Petersburg denies that Prince Milan has asked Russia to interfere for an armistice.

The Times correspondent telegraphs from Parisk on the 14th inst. "I had an interview with Prince Milan to-day. He denies that Servia is the tool of Russia. On the contrary Russia advised Servia against the war. The war was undertaken because Servia be-

lieves prosperity is impossible under Turkish administration. He does not look to diplomacy now, but to arms. He believes Servia will be victorious. He does not ask any power to assist, but expects no Christian states will take part against her. She will fight to the death for her rights."

The Times Parisk special, dated 16th inst., says, Belgrade telegrams are untrustworthy. There was no great battle between Osman Pasha and General Leschjanin on Wednesday. Both sides are preparing.

The Times correspondent sends the following by way of Odessa on Sunday—

"Contrary to Turkish official bulletins, dispatches received at the embassies report that the Servians have surrounded and bombarded the Novi Bazar. General Tcherayev was victorious at Akpalanka and Chirieny and threatened Sophia. The Montenegrins have advanced within one hour's distance of Mostar. The communication from their frontier to the sea at Klok are open to them."

The Times Ragusa special says the town of Metohica has hoisted the white flag. The population to the westward of Lake Scutari have risen. The Government of Schurial has ordered a conscription of the entire population to attack the Montenegrins.

The Times Berlin dispatch dated Sunday, says the defeat of Oetich is confirmed. He was attacked by superior forces at Florentine, but cut his way to the frontier with loss.

The Times Vienna special says Rumania has sent to the guaranteeing powers a memorandum explaining the unsatisfactory position in which she is placed under the Paris treaty. The memorandum says this position constitutes the great danger to peace between Rumania and points upon which the amendment is desired. Six of these points relate to her relations with Turkey, which, if granted, would make Rumania virtually independent. The seventh asks for the whole delta of the Danube from Tulcea downward.

A special to the Daily News recounts an interview with Prince Milan, of Servia, on Friday, to a correspondent with that of the Times. The Prince explained the comparative inaction of General Tcherayev, who is marching northward along the eastern frontier towards Saltschar, with eight battalions, to attack the Turkish army from Widdin, which is now at Ishoor. Gen. Tcherayev holds Akpalanka and Chirieny. No Turks have passed the defile of Novi Bazar. The Prince says the co-operation of the Montenegrins is thorough and hearty. A special to the News from Vienna says the Montenegrins took 1,500 prisoners on Saturday.

The Telegraph's Constantinople special says the Servians were defeated at Lubovic in Bosnia, losing two hundred killed and three hundred wounded, and also at Lisnor, where they lost nine hundred killed and wounded.

#### War Reports.

The Standard's Schabatz special says the Turks in Belina are surrounded by Servians of the Drina army; their capture or surrender is considered only a question of time. The Servians are preparing for immediate assault.

The Standard has a special from Semlin, dated Sunday, which says there is a rumor that Gen. Olynpius, commander of the Drina army, is a prisoner. The headquarters of the Servian army are at Tuzla. It can no longer be concealed that the remnants of Rumanians recruited in East Servia seem disinclined to fight against the Turks.

The Standard's Serbian correspondent has interviewed the revolutionary committee, who have removed Semlin from Bucharest. Members state positively that the rising of all Bulgarians is thoroughly arranged, and will break out immediately after the first Servian victory.

The Standard's telegram from Alexandria says that 3,000 more troops sailed for Turkey on Sunday.

The Standard's Vienna special says it is believed here that England will soon take the initiative for an armistice. The Turkish commander on the eastern frontier of Servia received unexpected orders on Saturday, and withdrew to Turkish territory. The easy success of the Montenegrins excites surprise when compared with the hard fighting of the Servians generally. It is reported that Lipitch and Metohica surrendered at the first assault.

The Standard's Berlin special says from the comparison of the Servian and Turkish accounts of the operations near Widdin, it seems certain that Servians retreated after a most gallant resistance.

#### SPAIN.

MADRID, 16.—Congress, after a long and strong debate, passed a vote of confidence in the ministry, 211 against 20.

#### DALMATIA.

Desperate Engagement—Servians Defeated.

RAGUSA, 16.—News from Servian sources announces that the Servians, after a desperate engagement, were defeated at Limburg on the 14th. The Turks captured the Servian cannon and a large booty, as well as their boats on the Drina, by means of which the latter intended to invade Turkish territory. The boats were destroyed. The Servians lost 500 men, and the Turks 200.

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Advancing into Servia.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 16.—The governor of Plewna is advancing into Servia with 2,000 troops.

#### Turkish Atrocities.

BELGRADE, 16.—Letters from Aleutitz state that the Circassians burned two Bulgarian villages, Baying Laya, murdering men and cutting children to pieces.

An official report states that during the Servian attack on Nova Varosh the Turks placed Christian women and children in the encampments and were killed by the Servian fire.
