Sketch of the Life of the Late Erastus B. Snow.

The following particulars of the life and death of Erastus B. Snow were de-layed in transmissian to the "News!" Erastus B. Snow, son of Apostle Erastus Snow and Artimesia Beman Snow, was born in Salt Lake City, May 10 1851, and died at his home in St

Show, was born in Sait Lake City, say 10 1853; and died at his home in St. George, Washington county, Utah, on September 22, 1900, at the age of 47. He moved south with his parents in April, 1862, and passed through all the trials incident to the settlement of southern Utah

southern Utah. His boyhood was spent in the labors of the farm and teaming, attending school a short time in the winter. He

later followed the carpenter trude and at the time of his death was engaged in mercantile and other pursuits. He was connected with the early organizawas connected with the early organiza-tion of the Sunday school and the Mu-tual Improvement Association of which he was first president. In January, 1878, he went as a mission-ary to the Indians of Arizona and New Mexico In company with A. W. Ivins, returning the following June. In 1878 he was called on a mission to England, and was absent two years. In 1887 he was again called to perform

In 1887 he was again called to perform a mission, this time to Old Mexico, and was gone about eighteen months. In 1888 he was appointed counselor to President D. D. McArthur of St. George

liake, and held the position until his death. The deceased has also filed a number of civil offices for several years past and the severe task placed upon him finally shattered his health and for the past year he has been a great suf-

The burden of the late Washington county fair, in which he took such an active part, and of which he was presi-dent, was too much for him in connection with his other duties, and on Mon-day the 17th he was compelled to yield to the strain. On Wednesday he was confined to his bed and grew worse unconfined to his bed and grew worse un-til Friday the family became so alarmed at his condition that his two children, who were in attendance at the B. Y. academy at Provo were telegraphed for. On Saturday his condition became worse and at 6:45 p. m., the end came. He leaves twelve children to revere his memory. His eldest son Erastus B. Snow, Jr., is now serving on a mis-sion in Kentucky.
