Father Tells How Captain's Wife **Claudia Made Full Confession** Of Her Misconduct.

STRONG WITNESS FOR SON.

Mother, Dressed in Deep Mourning, Told, in Almost Inandible Tones, Of Captain's Childhood.

Flushing, N. Y., Dec. 31.-Gen. Peter C. Hains, United States army, and his wife, Mrs. Virginia P. Hains, parents of Thornton J. Hains, now on trial as a principal in the slaying of William 49. Annis, were witnesses in their son's behalf and their testimony brought out in full detail the relationship of Mrs. Claudia Ibains and William E. Annis that caused the estrangement of Capt. Hains and his wife.

GEN, HAINS' EVIDENCT.

Gen. Halus declared that in his presance, and before his two sons, Peter and Thornton Hains, the captain's wife, Claudia Hains, made a full confession of her misconduct, and that subscquently Capt, Hains manifested such polynant grief from the disclosures that his mental condition became af-fracted. The confession which Gen. Hains declared his son's wife, Clanda, had signed on the day of the return of Capt. Hains from the west was read to

jury. on. Hains made a strong witness for his son, and counsel for the de-fense assorted tonight that the evi-dence was now conclusive that Capt. Jinins was mentally unbalanced when he shot Annis and that his act was one of his sole defing. The general will be

Through Mrs. Gen, Hains, who wept many times during her story, the de-fense drew out facts that Mains in his early life evidenced physical weak-nesses, which counsel will endeavor to prove through three experts, was a pre-disposing cause to insanity. Gen, Hains was permitted to say that his rather died from insanity.

HOOF AND MOUTH DISEASE ABOUT UNDER CONTROL

Washington. Dec. 31.—'T believe we've about gotten the foot and mouth disease corralled.' declared Secy. of Agriculture Wilson today. 'No new outbreaks of the disease have been fond since that which occurred in South ecounty. Fennsylvania, on Dec. 18.' continued the secretary. 'T want to emphasize, however, that we are tetting up in our investigations very slowly, because if we did not foreign countries might quarantine sgainst the whole United States, as they are very uspicious of getting the infection. "Since Nov. 10, when the foot and mouth disease made its first appear-ance is, the vicinity of Danville and Watsonville. Fa. the epidemic has pread to Maryland, New York and Michigan. Vigorous work on the part of the federal government practically has succeeded in exterminating the dis-cast neal of these states, and the fed-ral quarantine has thus far been mod-ified in Maryland, New York and Mich-iga, oradicating the disease, the cost of which, it is estimated, will be fully and million dollars in the four states. half a million dollars in the four states. The total number of animals slaugh-tered was 3,606, valued at \$88,268, of which the federal government will pay two-thirds and the states affected one-

Corsican was arrested, At the sound of the firing M. Clemenceau arouse and opened the window. In the street was an excited individual brandishing a revolver and crying "Down with the tyrant! Long live the republic!" At this moment the premier's guard, revolver in band, rushed from the building and started toward Bene-detti.

detti. "Don't fire!" shouted M. Clemen-ceau to the footman. "Don't fire!" yelled the Corsican: "I have thrown away my gun." Benedetti then submitted the ar-rest. He declared he was aggrieved at M. Clemenceau, who as minister of the interior refused him authority to launch a lottery scheme. The man fired five shots.
