At last Hegewisch is famous. ### Government Wins in Sugar Case

Washington, Dec. 7 .- The department of agriculture today issued a statement regarding the effect of the decision of the supreme court of the United States Monday in the case of the American Sugar Refining company et al vs the United States in which the court in affirming the action of the court of appeals of the second cir-cuit sustained the government as to sugar import rates. The statement says that ever since the present tariff act took effect and the regulations providing for the polarizing of sugar have been in effect importers have been pro-tected against the rate of duty paid, saying that the duties secured a ization which was too high and that the secretary of the treasury had no right to change the regulations or methods of polarization. The chief point rested upon the effect of the temperature up-on polarization. The department says that practically all the duties paid on sugar during the last five years has been under protest, and adds:

"The amount saved during that time has been about \$3,000,000. A conserva-tive estimate of the claims which would have been filed had the decision gone the other way shows the large sums of not less than five and perhaps eight million dollars.
