THE SOCIAL EVIL AND DR. HOLLAND'S FREE LOVE BILL.

[CONCLUDED.]

THE BRUTALITY OF THE ORDINANCE!
In the name of virtue and the pretended interest of the public health, the twenty-three sections of this scheme for regulating the social evil, devised by various artifices, to make it personally safe for lustful men to visit the haunts of pollution. The city police (Sec. 1 of Dr. Holland's Bill) is virtually placed at the disposal of the Board of Health, to furnish it with a record of the name, residence, age and previous calling of each woman in the city who shall elect to be a courtesan. Each of these (Sec. 11) must submit to examination weekly, and if so required, by a medical examiner of the male persuasion, of course; and if she fails to submit to examination, she will be subject to the punishment of any fine from \$25 to \$100, or imprisonment. To make the protection complete to the masculine army of free-lovers, no hard (Sec. 12) shall allow any prostitute prescribed by a medical examiner to remain in her house for a longer period than twelve hours without notifying the Chief of Police, under penalty of fine or imprisonment. Neither shall she permit (Sec. 14) under similar penalty, any prostitute to remain in her house for more than twenty-four hours, without being duly registered, without giving a similar notice to the same officer. So much for the watchful eye of the city police upon the faithful wing of the lustful army.

THE HYPOCRISY OF THE ORDINANCE.
To demonstrate the insincerity and hypocrisy of the Board of Health as to its anxiety to preserve the public health, it subjects man to no espionage, and imposes upon him neither examining committee nor subjects him to the observance of any rules. He may be a recruit from Japan, Jerusalem or Jericho—from Canada, Copenhagen or Constantinople—putrid with contagious syphilitic blood—the prophet of disease and the minister of corruption, decay and premature death—to rove with an unchallenged license whithersoever his lecherous impulses may direct. It offers neither protection to virtuous wives from roving husbands, nor to young and innocent women against the seductive arts of corrupted men. It takes no rate of damage to be collected by women diseased by male visitors.

A BITE LEAD FOR THE MEDICINE.
It offers position and pay to an army of amoral medicine men, at the expense of the prostitute class. This ordinance provides (Sec. 10) that the city shall be divided into districts, each of which shall be assigned by the Board of Health to the supervision of a medical examiner, who shall be a graduated physician of some medical school in good standing. The said Board (Sec. 7) shall establish a Hospital for the care of the diseased prostitute, and also a House of Industry for the profitable employment of convalescing victims; and to maintain in these expenditures of medical examination and the institutions named above, each prostitute (Sec. 8) is required, under penalty of fine or imprisonment, to pay the sum of \$10 a month for Hospital dues, \$1 a week for medical examination, and an additional \$1.50 a week for Hospital dues—making a total of \$25.50 annual tax upon each prostitute. If there be 4,000 of this class of our city population, this tax will foot up an annual revenue of one million dollars, to be divided mostly among these chivalrous members of the medical profession who shall be so fortunate as to be humble workers in this profitable field of moral reform. Is it any wonder that Dr. Holland and his sleek associates on the Board of Health should have a generous eye to the interest of a portion of the hungry and impecunious wing of the profession, whose precarious incomes are not equal to their aspiring ambition? Is it not both wise and well to make unfortunate women useful and profitable to a noble profession?

IT RAISES PROSTITUTION TO THE DIGNITY OF A PROFESSION.
This ordinance, if it shall become a law by the Board of Aldermen, will make masculine free lust and the prostitution of women both legally safe and respectable. It proposes to take prostitution, which is now a legal crime, to give it a legal existence, and to raise it to the dignity of a profession, on the flimsy plea and pretense that it cannot be abated, and therefore the public morals and health demand that it should be brought under the regime of law. But this plea is urged by men for men, and not by women for the benefit of women. If prostitution and impecunious should fall upon the heads of any, let them be upon those who are the direct cause of the evil.

IT IS AN INSULT TO COMMON DECENCY.
A government may be powerless to arrest the commission of a crime or to punish the criminal, but it has no moral right therefore to declare that the crime was a harmless act if done by a rule and practiced under an indulgence secured by a money license. We have borrowed many of our vicious customs from the old world. We should be spared this Turkish infliction. This crime, once legalized, then stealing or highway robbery or counterfeiting or arson or assassination may grow into importance and power beyond the control of legislation, the courts and the executive arm of the government, and may claim with equal propriety the sanction and authority of law, by which they may be brought under the control and operation of law. This proposed ordinance, we say is a declaration, a horrible junkie of abomination, a heavy blow at common decency, a confession to the inefficiency and rottenness of our civilization, an insult to womanhood, an outrage on our common humanity, meeting the heavy exaction of every good citizen, and should receive an affirmative vote for indefinite postponement from every member of the Board of Supervisors.

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
