What made the U. council most angry yesterday was a letter from Colorado in which fear was expressed that Utah might hold out the \$250 coming to he from the track meet, during the footbell season. The insinuation that Utah would fight dishonestly with niggardliness was more than the U. boys could stand. They wanted to sever all athletic relations with Colorado, but wise heads decided football and track meets should not be mixed as Colorado seems afraid will be done. So the U. eleven will play Boulder on Cummings field Nov. 14 unless Boulder finds another loop-hole, through which to crawl if possible. The U. council wrote an indignant letter to Colorado, asking what was meant by insinuating Utah would hold out money from football to get even for an old raw deal; other things were explained sträight from the shoulder, and it's now up to Colorado to be good and play ball. UTAH WAS ANGRY.

OBJECT TO ILLS.

The Boulder embroglio being tucked away, the next thing brought before the attention of the athletic officials was a report which says all Colorado schools will refuse to live up to their contracts if Edgar Mills is in the U. line-up. It is claimed Mills was forbidden to compete in intercollegiate games because of standing or lack of standing in Colorado schools. The charge is made that he could not have restantly because of his class standing, it seems he is charge with having taken a special course, in which he was not in full standing or something of the nature. The coaching staff here say the howl over Mills should get no serious notice. He was incligible under the "one-year" law in Colorado, but is eligible here, and that is all there seems to be to it.
