Unless Colorado shows some new form of football, the Utah-Boulder football game will be played here Nov. 14. This decision was reached at a meeting of the athletic council yesterday afternoon. The session covered several hours and at times it looked bad, for Utah-Colorado relations were to be cut off, sharp and forever. Bad feeling arose last spring when Utah's track men went to Colorado to compete. Boulder, on the alert to find some excuse for "polishing" spotted Brinton, the crack sprinter. UTAH WAS ANGRY.

What made the U. council most angry yesterday was a letter from Colorado in which four weeks ago the state of Utah might hold out the \$250 coming to it from the track meet, during the football season. The insinuation that Utah would fight dishonestly with a readiness was more than the U. boys could stand. They wanted to sever all athletic relations with Colorado, but wise heads decided football and track meets should not be mixed as Colorado seems afraid will be done. So the U. eleven will play Boulder on Cummings field Nov. 14 unless Boulder finds another loophole, through which to crawl if possible. The U. council wrote an indignant letter to Colorado, asking what was meant by insinuating that Utah would hold out money from football to get even for an old raw deal. Other things were explained straight from the shoulder, and it's now up to Colorado to be good and play ball.

OBJECT TO ILLS.

The Boulder embargo being tucked away, the next thing brought before the attention of the athletic officials was a letter which says all Colorado schools will refuse to live up to their contract. If Edgar Mills is in the U. line-up, it is claimed Mills was forbidden to compete in intercollegiate games because of standing or lack of standing in Colorado schools. The charge is made that he could not play football because of his class standing. It seems he is charged with having taken a special course, in which he was not in full attendance, or something of the nature. The coaching staff here say the howl over Mills should be no serious notice. He was ineligible under the "one-year" law in Colorado, but is eligible here, and that is all there seems to be to it.

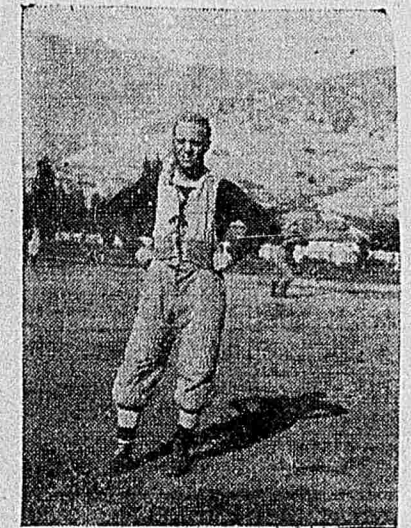

RUTH DILLON'S BIG WIN

Surprises Fifteen Thousand Racegoers By Leading Three Heats and Pulling Down \$10,000.

Columbus, O., Sept. 22.—Ruth Dillon, a four-year-old Sidney Dillon trotter, owned by Sterling H. Holt of Indianapolis, and driven by Millard Sanders, surprised the 15,000 racegoers this afternoon by winning all three heats of the Foster-Columbus stake, valued at \$10,000.

Ruth was number four in the betting, being overlooked almost entirely, and selling at \$10 in pools of \$25. Spanish Queen was the first choice, while there was a heavy bet on Aqueduct.

Scoring in the seven heats in the first heat, Ruth Dillon got away well, and stayed alongside of Aqueduct to the half, where she pulled out and won by a four-year-old trotter of any sex this year, and won a half-second of the world's record for trotting mares of age.

Spanish Queen did not act well until the third heat, when she was badly out of the stretch, making a break in the stretch in the second mile when he was rushing toward the front.

In the third heat, Spanish Queen closed rapidly in the last quarter, and it seemed as if she would keep Ruth Dillon from making the three straight heats. But she lifted his mare across the finish line, winning by a scant neck. Her share of the purse was \$3,000.
