JERSEY CITY, N. ## Another Fatal Bailroad Accident.

CONCORD, N. H., 18 .- An accident on the northern division of the Boston & Lowell Railroad, by which three per-sons were killed and five others were lojured, occurred this morning be-tween East Andover and West Andover. Newman concerning the established church, is certainly one of the most extraordinary occurrences of the cam-paign. He advises the Catholics to assist the conservatives in maintaing the established church against the attacks of its enemies, declaring that it is one of the greatest bulwarks of Eng-land against athelsm. "I wish all success to those defending the church, and I and my friends will join in de-fending it." Many affect to see in the Cardinal's exhortation nothing more than the political adoption of the Ry-man church's principles, that any re-ligion is better than no religion, but his words have attracted universal at-tention here, and will undoubtedly assist the Conservatives who, as a party, stand by the church, in order to se-cure an alliance with the Irish party. They do not predict a victory, but say their assurance is that in no event can the Liberals win by large majorities. The Conservative party leaders are so convinced of this that the Marquis of Salisbury has, it is stated, decided to
