To show the exactitude and system with which the work is conducted, reflecting the highest credit on Brother T. O. 
Secretary Bristow is making up a programme of a general inspection of the principal custom houses of the country. His ideas look toward cutting down the number of employes, and the bringing of the service up to a higher standard of efficiency than it now occupies. Incidentally attention is to be paid to solving the problem of the large increase of smuggling recently, which has operated to greatly decrease the revenues from customs.

The Commissioner of Patents was before the House committee on appropriations yesterday (23rd) asking an increase of force in his office without a corresponding increase of appropriation. The commissioner proposes to do this by a reduction of clerks in the higher grades, and setting apart the sum form, and runs into a receptacle. thus realized to the compensation of salaries of an increased number, est grade.
