Imprisoning the Father of Waters Within Earthen Walls.

PROTECTION AGAINST FLOOD

How the Mighty River is Kept Within Its Banks-Work of Constructing 1,500 Miles of Embankments.

Special Correspondence.

Memphis, Tenn., April 6.-The late Memphis floods, which have inundated large areas of bottom lands both above and below this city, driving many people from their homes, destroying much property and costing several lives, reawaken interest in the daring attempt of man to imprison the Father of Waters betwen the great earthen walls.

Few people outside the lower Mississippi valley realize the magnitude of the task nor the necessity of holding in check a great stream at flood tide varying in width from half a mile to a mile and a half, from 80 to 150 feet deep, its volume swollen so that the stages mark 40 feet above low water and the great torrent moving grandly at a speed of five or six miles an hour, twice the usual velocity of the stream.

That the efforts to confine the waters of this mighty river within its banks are not always successful is evidenced by the widespread devastations which have resulted from the floods of this and previous years. While the stress upon the controlling barriers is only felt in the flood season, when the Mississippi's normal waters are augment-ed a hundred fold by the spring treshets of its numerous tributaries, the it-most care and almost ceaseless labor are required all the year around to keep these barriers in repair against the time when the snow and ice imprisoned waters of the farther north are let loose by the returning sun and comrushing madly down toward the sea in a wild, relentless and resistless tor-
