LOCAL BRIEFS.

Mrs. Stevenson Recovering—Mrs. A. R. Stevenson is convalescing from an operation in the Graves L. D. S. hospital.
Recent are Scarce—There have been no entertainments received at the city recording station at the office since Feb. 27.
Sail For Home—Colonel N. W. Clayton and Miss S. B. Clayton sailed Saturday from Europe for New York, en route home to Salt Lake.
Getting Canal in Shape—The Irrigated Lands company is pushing the bottom of the Price canal and asking the State treasury to make additional work later on.
New Pastor Coming—The American Christian Missionary board will send a pastor to Salt Lake to fill the pulpit vacated by Rev. Albert Buxton who has removed to Eureka to teach school.
Discover Service Ends—The continuing services of the Jewish Passover were held last evening when Rabbi Freund spoke on "Another Word on the Conception of the Jewish Messiah."
Hand Concerts at Fort Douglas—The Fifteenth U. S. Infantry Band concerts are held at this post every Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday afternoons from four to five, unless inclement weather prevents. Guard mount is held daily at 10 o'clock a. m.
Officers are Selected—The Jewish Congregation yesterday held its annual meeting yesterday when the following officers were chosen: J. Shuler, president; Lewis, vice president; M. Alder secretary, and M. Rosenblatt, treasurer. G. M. Lewis, S. Reikstein and M. Nathan, trustees.
Service For Prisoners—Another interesting service was held in Judge Rowman's court yesterday for the city prisoners. The attendance was good and those present listened with marked interest in the talk made by Harry Jacobson, who was in charge of the service. Appropriate hymns were sung in which the prisoners joined.
Visitors Quarantined—Word from the state prison this morning, stated that the quarantine against visitors would probably be continued through this month, on account of the prevalence of smallpox in town. The prison management is taking no chances of the disease getting into the institution. There are now 298 convicts there.
Funeral of Christina Hansen—Mrs. Christina Appeline Hansen, who died Friday from heart failure, was buried this afternoon from the undertaking chapel of S. M. Taylor & Co., commencing at 2:30 o'clock. She was 82 years of age and a native of Opepla, Sweden. She came to Utah about 18 years ago, and her first husband was named Peterson.
New Undertaking Establishment—Ritter Hall has removed his undertaking establishment from 225 south West Temple to 164 on the same street. A fire proof vault where bodies may be stored, and finally on shipment, and a commodious and well equipped chapel including apartments for chairs and immediate relatives of the deceased are furnished.
Funeral of L. A. Stevenson—The second ward meetinghouse yesterday afternoon occurred the funeral services of Louis A. Stevenson, a well known citizen, on account of the prevalence of smallpox in town. The funeral services were held at 2:30 o'clock. The deceased was 52 years of age and a native of Opepla, Sweden. Celebrating With Firearms—During the Easter celebration among the foreigners on west Second South street yesterday afternoon, Hinton and Yeager were kept on the jump trying to prevent careless men from firing off revolvers. About a dozen shots were fired and finally Yeager managed to catch Peter Gunn in the act of shooting. After he was locked in jail the firing stopped.
Salt Works Ready in May—The rebuilt salt works at Saltair will be ready for operation by May 1, with a capacity of 150 tons of refined salt per day of the motive power will be electricity, furnished by the Territorial Power company, and the boilers, in a house 200 feet away from the main buildings, will be used only to furnish heat which will dry the salt. The construction of the new plant is of the "slow burning" character.
Big Mitt Brings Trouble—Last evening, C. C. Riley, a special policeman, arrested William Peterson, 314 Temple street, on suspicion of being one of the men wanted for the robbery of a second-hand store in Ogden a few days ago. Peterson had among his effects a new pair of high priced baseball glove which he claims he purchased for 25 cents. Such articles were among the things stolen from the store, and he is being held pending further investigation.
Build Hatcheries at Once—Fred W. Chambers, state fish and game commissioner, is preparing to begin work on the three hatcheries which were authorized by the legislature and approved by Governor Snyder. Within the next week, work will begin on the construction and the hatcheries will be finished within 90 days. One is to be located near Springville, Utah county, another near Fish Lake in Sevier county, and the third near Pangatch Lake in Garfield county.
Funeral of A. C. Nordberg—A. C. Nordberg, who met death in the yards of the Salt Lake and Ogden Hallways yesterday, was buried yesterday afternoon, after services in the First ward meetinghouse, commencing at 2 o'clock. Bishop Joseph Warburton presided and was one of the speakers, others being Elders Charles E. Rogers, John Heilmann, A. O. Miller and John T. Thorpe. The house was filled to its capacity, many railroad employees being present.
Funeral of Workman Child—The funeral of Workman Child, the friend of the Rev. Dr. W. H. Woodruff, of M. and Mrs. Oliver G. Workman, was held from the family residence yesterday, conducted by Bishop Woodruff of the Episcopal ward. The services were held by Bishops Morris and Elias S. Woodruff, and Elder Daniel LeVingston, the Episcopal ward choir and Miss Ora Child singing music. The little one, who was suffering from pneumonia, died very suddenly during a fit of coughing.
