Joseph Smith presided over the Mormons fourteen years, Brigham Young, his successor, has ruled over them twenty-four years, and the latter, in an address delivered lately in the Tabernacle at Salt Lake City, said no man nor woman could truthfully say that in that time, he, Young, "ever gave a wrong word of counsel, or a word of advice that could not be sanctioned by the heavens."

That certainly shows Young believes himself to be inspired.—Cleveland Herald.

Of the Mormon Temple at Kirtland, and the remnant of that peculiar people now remaining there, the Painesville Advertiser says:

Little remains to remind one of the once flourishing colony of Mormons, except the "Temple," which, from the historical associations connected therewith, is visited by parties from far and near out of curiosity; and the magnificent view obtained of the surrounding country from its elevated tower will richly repay one for the time and trouble requisite to gain the summit. The Temple itself is in a very fair state of preservation, considering the length of time it has been built and the little care bestowed in keeping it in repair. There is but a small remnant of the "faithful" still resident there, who occasionally meet for worship in the building once their pride and boast. Most of them followed the fortunes of their Prophet to the western wilds.—Cleveland Herald.

AARON BURR DEFIANT.—When Aaron Burr returned to New York city to practice law, after his voluntary exile in Europe, he found the late Reverend Jedediah Burchard, then a celebrated revivalist, holding a series of protracted meetings in his family church. He attended from habit, always went late, and disturbed the services by attracting to himself the attention of the audience, on account of his infamous notoriety as the man who shot Alexander Hamilton, and who had been tried for treason. Mr. Burchard resolved to rebuke him openly. The next Sabbath he came in and got about half way up the aisle; the clergyman paused in his discourse, and pointing at Colonel Burr, said, in the most scathing manner, "You hoary-headed old sinner, I'll appear against you at the day of judgment!" The proud, defiant old man, standing erect as ever, with the perfect composure which never deserted him, and fixing his fine grey eyes on the occupant of the pulpit, replied, Mr. Burchard, I have observed, through a long course of professional experience, that the very meanest class of criminals are those who turn State's evidence!

PREVALENCE OF FAMINE IN EUROPE.—The extent to which famine prevails in various parts of Europe and on the southern shore of the Mediterranean is somewhat remarkable.

The St. Petersburg correspondent of the London Morning Herald states that the distress amongst the poorer classes in Russia, owing to the bad harvest, is in many parts of the country very severe. At the opening of the Provincial Assembly of Novgorod; the governor recommended a liberal vote of money to supply the peasants with the means of subsistence. The Governor of Olonetz opened the Provincial Assembly of that government with a similar address.

With the accounts of suffering in Sweden we are already familiar. In Eastern Prussia the destitution is so severe that members of the royal family have volunteered to obtain contributions, and Parliament has appropriated considerable sums, which thus far prove inadequate.

Not only in France but along the northern coast of Africa the lack of food is general. According to a recent letter from Paris, the number of deaths in Algiers within the last six months, from starvation, exceeds 100,000. This, the correspondent asserts, is no exaggeration. In the adjoining government of Tunis, from the sea-coast to the interior, there are numerous deaths from starvation. Last year complaints of the scarcity of food were seldom heard outside of India.
