Logan, Cache Co., Feb. 20.-For two days moisture has been descending in the shape of snow or rain, and the result is extremely muddy streets and a large "glad" in the farmer's heart. Business is suffering temporarily, but prospect of much wheat in the granger's bin and many beets to pile up at the sugar factory next fail makes up

for the present quiet season. Great things are confidently predicted for Cache valley the coming year. The sugar factory is an assured realily; the woolen factory is in a fair way to materialize; a fruit canning factory is in excellent prospect, and last but not least an electric road from Logan through the south end of the valley and possibly on to Ogden, is among the probabilities. The great Hercules Power company, whose plant at the mouth of Logan canyon is in shape to put out 0,000 horse power over its lines, and which has practically completed sur-

veys for wires to Salt Lake, has had this matter under consideration for a long time, and it is understood that through its efforts sufficient capital has been interested to put the project into effect as soon as it appears that such a line would be a paying investment. The discovery of a four-foot vein of silver and lead ore in the New State mine, east of Paradise, the other day,

gives promise of ore hauling to the nearest railroad, and the P. A. Nelsen mine in Blacksmith fork canyon, which has already demonstrated its ability to profitably ship its ores, would also fur-nish its quota. Such a road would do an immense amount of passenger and freight business from the southern set-tlements to Logan and vice versa. which could not but increase as time

Butte, Mont., Feb. 22 .- The program of the first issue stakes for the meetings at Butte and Anaconda of the Montana Jockey club, of which H. L. Wilson is president and Louis Frank secretary, was issued today. All entries for the first issue stakes April 10.-The club proposes to give sixty days' racing in Butte and Anaconda, commencing Saturday, June 29. The stakes announced are:
