The Town of Tia Juana Washed Away: Damage is Other Places.

THE CALIFORNIA FLOOD.

ONE-TOWN BUSINESS WASHED AWAY: OTHER DAMAGE.

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Feb. 25.—The storm of Sunday and Monday was the most severe ever experienced to this section. The damage to railroads and telegraph lines was great, and it will be a week-long interval before it can be ascertained as before the flood. The town of Tia Juana on the Mexican line is half washed away, except base. Houses which were well built have been as far as further use. The Grijalva River took its banks and washed the Tia Juana River until it flooded the entire country, sweeping away houses, trees, animals, and everything that came in the path. Two persons are reported drowned at Tia Juana. The telegraph lines are reported at Atotonilco, 12 miles from Tia Juana, as having failed during the storm. On the Cuyamaca road several washouts occurred and the San Diego River bridge is washed away. At Escondido the railroads were considerably damaged. The road work on the Escondido River is totally washed away, but no less of life is reported than in some cases in San Diego. Although considerable damage will be done, the wind attained a velocity of forty miles per hour.

FURTHER DETAILS OF INVAPATHON.

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Feb. 25.—The reports continue to come in from the surrounding country and give further details of the inundation. The reports which are exaggerated it is impossible to give an estimate of the losses, but the amount will be considerable. It is now known that many lives have been lost. We have had no information from the Seaside, Los Angeles, nor from Wilmington. Los Angeles and Weirles bodies have been recovered, but the other two are missing.

Near the San Gabriel the river formerly passed down east of town, now it is flowing west of town and is a stream two hundred feet wide. The water has covered the valley and carried away a house about down near Downey. From Ten Mile House to the ocean there is a vast area of land, about ten miles wide and fifteen miles long, the Charles Watt family, supposed to have been drowned near Downey, turned up all right. The Santa Fe road to San Joaquin is broken and may not be opened for a week.
