until the electric railway began to cut into its traffic it charged \$1 for a round trip Mount Vernon ticket, while it sold round trip tickets for a wharf on the Maryland side of the Potomac, almost directly opposite Mount Vernon, for twenty-five cents. Now that the exclusive whart privileges are not so desirable this steam boat company had the cheek to ask the lady regents to excuse it from paying that adultional nine cents a passenger during the re-mainder of its contract. The agitation for the purchase of Mount Vernon by government and it being the open without charge to thrown all comers seems to have temporarily died out, but that it will sooner o-later be done is the general belief. Surely it is not just the proper thing to charge an admission fee to the home of George Washington, although un-der present conditions it is necessary order to raise the money to keep the grounds in condition and the house in repair.

Either many congressmen are going to vote contrary to their talk or the administration is preparing a great dis-appointment for itself in regard to the silver question. It is stated with the greatest apparent coufidence by mem . bers of the administration that President Cleveland has assurances which make him certain that there will be no trouble in passing a bill for the unconditional repeal of the Sherman eliver law through both the House and Senate as soon as Congress gets to work. This is directly contrary to what Senator Stewart, who claims to have made a canvas of the Senate, says. Can it be possible that some of the senators have been telling the President one thing and Senator Stewart another? Perhaps after all it is merely a game of political brag all around.

Becretary Hoke Smith is now hearing a land case involving several mil-lion dollars worth of land in the state or Washington, upon which are some 1,500 settlers. The land in question is claimed by the Northern acific Rail-road company. The record of Secretary Smith has been such that it is altogether probable that it there are any doubts in the case he will give the settlers the benefit of them.

The state department will shortly make public all of the correspondence with Mr. Blount, both as commissioner and minister to Hawaii.

## BOARD OF EDUCATION DOINGS.

The city school board met in regular session Thursday eve., all the members being in attendance except Pratt. President Nelson occupied the chair.

The result of the recent election for tbe issuance of \$225,000 twenty-year school bonds was officially reported upon. It showed 827 affirmative and 212 negative votes, and 4 blanks.

The president and clerk were directed to file a certificate and affidavit of the result as required by law.

Char es Fallentine and thirty-five others, residents of District No. 23, asked the board to select one of the proposed new sites in their district for the erection of a building, as at present they are compelled to pay a rental of \$500 a year for a structure that will accommodate only seventy students.

The committee on sites and buildings reported that they had interviewed the city engineer in regard to the feasibility of establishing permaneat grades on the streets adjoining the Washington school site, and expecially Peach, from First West to Center streets, and recommended that the clerk be addressed to petition the City Council in behalf of the board to have said grade established as soon as possible. Acopted. Ware & Cornell submitted sketches

of eight and twelve room buildings, which they offered to furnish plans for at the following prices: Twelve for a time following price: Twelve room diagonal building, \$750; eight room building, \$500. For outplicate plans of Jackson school, including any alterations desired and a different exterior, \$750. Committee un sitea ano

buildings. The committee on sites and buildings reported that they had conferred with the contractor, B. C. Shirrell, for the erection of the Wasatch school building, and also with his bundsmen, Kidder and Gibson, and that it was not probable that the quality of pressed brick required by the specifications can be obtained in time to complete the building by Beptember 1. Hence they recommended that the first quality, white wire cut common brick, of uniform color, be substituted, in consideration of which the contractor had agreed to deduct \$1,600 from the contract price. They also recommended that the entire contract be trans-terred to the boudsmen, and that they be given until September 1 to complete the building, and that the sum of \$100 be deducted from the contract price as liquidated damages for each and every day that the said building is not delivered ready for occupancy September 1, 1893. after

Pike moved to amend the reput by adding that the written corsent of the contractor be obtained to the transfer of the contract to his bondsmen Carried.

The matter was then referred back

for further report.

The same committee recommended that A. F. Parshall be employed to turnish the blackboard for the Jackson school building, at 55 cents per rquare yard, which is 60 per cent of the cost paid for the blackboards now in the schools. Adopteu.
