

until the electric railway began to cut into its traffic it charged \$1 for a round trip Mount Vernon ticket, while it sold round trip tickets for a wharf on the Maryland side of the Potomac, almost directly opposite Mount Vernon, for twenty-five cents. Now that the exclusive wharf privileges are not so desirable this steamboat company had the cheek to ask the lady regents to excuse it from paying that additional nine cents a passenger during the remainder of its contract. The agitation for the purchase of Mount Vernon by the government and it being thrown open without charge to all comers seems to have temporarily died out, but that it will sooner or later be done is the general belief. Surely it is not just the proper thing to charge an admission fee to the home of George Washington, although under present conditions it is necessary in order to raise the money to keep the grounds in condition and the house in repair.

Either many congressmen are going to vote contrary to their talk or the administration is preparing a great disappointment for itself in regard to the silver question. It is stated with the greatest apparent confidence by members of the administration that President Cleveland has assurances which make him certain that there will be no trouble in passing a bill for the unconditional repeal of the Sherman silver law through both the House and Senate as soon as Congress gets to work. This is directly contrary to what Senator Stewart, who claims to have made a canvas of the Senate, says. Can it be possible that some of the senators have been telling the President one thing and Senator Stewart another? Perhaps after all it is merely a game of political brag all around.

Secretary Hoke Smith is now hearing a land case involving several million dollars worth of land in the state of Washington, upon which are some 1,500 settlers. The land in question is claimed by the Northern Pacific Railroad company. The record of Secretary Smith has been such that it is altogether probable that if there are any doubts in the case he will give the settlers the benefit of them.

The state department will shortly make public all of the correspondence with Mr. Blount, both as commissioner and minister to Hawaii.

### BOARD OF EDUCATION DOINGS.

The city school board met in regular session Thursday eve., all the members being in attendance except Pratt. President Nelson occupied the chair.

The result of the recent election for the issuance of \$225,000 twenty-year school bonds was officially reported upon. It showed 827 affirmative and 212 negative votes, and 4 blanks.

The president and clerk were directed to file a certificate and affidavit of the result as required by law.

Charles Fallentine and thirty-five others, residents of District No. 23, asked the board to select one of the proposed new sites in their district for the erection of a building; as at present they are compelled to pay a rental of \$500 a year for a structure that will accommodate only seventy students.

The committee on sites and buildings reported that they had interviewed the city engineer in regard to the feasibility of establishing permanent grades on the streets adjoining the Washington school site, and especially Peach, from First West to Center streets, and recommended that the clerk be directed to petition the City Council in behalf of the board to have said grade established as soon as possible. Adopted.

Ware & Cornell submitted sketches of eight and twelve room buildings, which they offered to furnish plans for at the following prices: Twelve room diagonal building, \$750; eight room building, \$500. For duplicate plans of Jackson school, including any alterations desired and a different exterior, \$750. Committee on sites and buildings.

The committee on sites and buildings reported that they had conferred with the contractor, S. C. Shirrell, for the erection of the Wasatch school building, and also with his bondsmen, Kluder and Gibson, and that it was not probable that the quality of pressed brick required by the specifications can be obtained in time to complete the building by September 1. Hence they recommended that the first quality, white wire cut common brick, of uniform color, be substituted, in consideration of which the contractor had agreed to deduct \$1,600 from the contract price. They also recommended that the entire contract be transferred to the bondsmen, and that they be given until September 1 to complete the building, and that the sum of \$100 be deducted from the contract price as liquidated damages for each and every day that the said building is not delivered ready for occupancy after September 1, 1893.

Pike moved to amend the report by adding that the written consent of the contractor be obtained to the transfer of the contract to his bondsmen. Carried.

The matter was then referred back for further report.

The same committee recommended that A. F. Parshall be employed to furnish the blackboard for the Jackson school building, at 55 cents per square yard, which is 60 per cent of the cost paid for the blackboards now in the schools. Adopted.
