Lancaster, Pa., July 14. - John O'Brien and Joseph Furman, allas Day, who, it is alleged, murdered the aged toll gate keeper, Samuel Rossler, near Leaman Place, on the night of July 1, after a sensational raid upon the village of Gordonville, arrived in Lancaster at 10:10 o'clock tonight as prisoners. They were arrested last Friday at Norfolk. A crowd of a thou-sand or more people who had gathered sand or more people who had gathere at the Pennsylvania railroad station

made a rush for the murderers. A squad of police with drawn revolvers formed about the prisoners and clubbed their way to a waiting trolley car. The crowd attacked the car, pulling the trolley pole from the overhead wires, It was only after driving back the angry crowd at pistol points that the car was got under way. A half dozen shots were fired at the car as it moved off. At the jail there was another
