a recent photograph, friends will recog-nize the familiar features of the Hoa. John T. Caine, who has just attained his eightieth birthday. Surrounded by his immediate family a fitting celebra-tion of the auspicous event took place within the week at the new home of the venerable gentlemen on seventh avenue. Those who know him can hardly believe that four score of year have passed since he first saw that avenue. Those who know him can hardly believe that four score of rear have passed since he first saw the light of day on the Isle of Man, ao genty have they dealt with him. His has been an active life from the time of his birth. His parents were not able to furnish him with the education is hoped for so he determined to get it himself. While yet a youth he smigrated to this country, coming first to New York and then to St. Louis, Ma. where he married and later came to Utah, then an apparently desolate country. No history of this state would be complete without a record of the work of John T. Caine. His theatrical career first brought him into prominence beginning with the opening of the Social hall in the early fiftes where audlences saw him in pleasing roles, and when the Salt Lake Theatr was built by President Brigham Young some years later, John T. Caine was usually on the bills presented, Later he and Bishop H. B. Clawson were associated in the management of this historic old playhouse. Then came the launching of the Salt Lake Herald by himself and associates and then his election as city recorder for a couple of terms and finally his election to the Congress of the United States as delegate from the territory of Utah, the of terms and finally his election to the Congress of the United States as deliggate from the territory of Utah, the crowning success of his congressional career being the securement of state-hood for the people he had serval faithfully and well. He was later the candidate of his party for governar of the new state but shared that party's defeat in the election. He was a member of the constitutional conven. member of the constitutional tion, has been state senator and within the last few years has been superinten dent of waterworks of this city and director of the Zion's Savings Bank and Trust company.
