FOURTH DISTRICT COURT.

Plaintiff sued the defendant company in Justice Allen's court in Goshen for damages for cattle alleged to be killed by the railway company in the spring of 1900, and was awarded \$200, from which judgment defendant appealed to the district court.

At the meeting of the city council last evening the board of health recommended that the sewer be extended to block 69, plat A. Referred to the committee on sewerage.

The committee on irrigation recommended the following water tax to be assessed for irrigation for the year: City lots, 75 cents each; farming land, 75 cents per acre, and that the following assessment be made for the water company for machinery: Provo Woolen Mills company, \$250; Excelsior Roller Mills, \$110; Sun Foundry and Machine company, \$40; E. J. Ward & Sons, \$100; Hans Foulson, \$10; Knight & Sons, \$10; Provo Woolen Mills (Tanner's) \$10.

The recommendations were adopted. Saturday, March 7th, was set for hearing complaints of erroneous assessments of water tax.

The committee on judiciary reported an assessment of five cents for water on the petition for segregation from the city. The report recommended that the portion lying on the west of the east side of Fourth West street and south of the north side of Provo river be segregated from the city. The report was amended to read from the west side of Fourth West street and adopted.

PROVO CANYON SNOWSLIDE.

Dams River and Impedes Travel - Asylum Affairs - Court Notes.

Provo, Utah, Feb. 20.—The water in Provo river has been higher for several days past than at any time during the winter season last spring. The rise has been caused by heavy rains in the mountains.

Yesterday there was a perceptible fall in the river, owing to an immense snow slide in the Provo canyon, which came down shortly after noon and stopped the flow of water. The slide is above the Telluride company's power plant, and has covered the R. G. W. railway track running down from Main street where the current was strong, and before he was rescued he was carried quite a distance. Quite a number of people began to think that Eureka was going to be visited by another flood similar to the one which did so much damage here several years ago, and in which two lives were lost. But it is still coming down but no further danger is anticipated.
