PROVO CANYON SNOWSLIDE. Dams River and Impedes Travel Asylum Affairs-Court Notes.

Special Correspondence. Provo, Utah Co., Feb. 20.—The water in Provo river has been higher for several days past than at any time during high water season last spring. The rise has been caused by heavy rains in the mountains.

RAINS CAUSE SERIOUS FLOOD Sreets and Stores Flooded-No Casualties-Funeral of M. Gardner Sr.

Special Correspondence, Eureka, Feb. 19.-Heavy rains here today caused a partial flooding of the town and tracks of the Oregon Short Line railway. Shortly after noon the water came down Main street, and for a few hours it seemed as though it would do a great amount of damage.
