Yesterday's registration was very gratifying, amounting to about 5,000, and when the books closed it was estimated that in the city a grand total of 21,000 that in the city a grand total of 21,000 voters had been enrolled. It is expected that 2,000 more will be added to the books today, which, with 11,000 in the county outside the city, will make a total voting strength of 84,000. With all registered, the lists will be carefully gone over and arrangements made for an early and heavy vote on election day.

I sincerely hope you will take part in the campaign and answer my written arguments or my spoken arguments. The Review published a long article from me about two weeks ago, to which I invite your attention. I do not intend any discourtesy to you in refusing to debate with you, but I hardly think I would be justified in debating with anyons unless there are additionally in the second state. anyone unless they are candidates for or now occupy positions which call upon them either to make or to enforce laws against criminals, as I regard the Mor-mon people to be.
