FREE LIBRARIES FOR EVERY TOWN Enthusiastic Meeting Endorsing Movement Held Yesterday Afternoon at Barratt Hall, GOVERNOR CUTLER SPEAKS. Leading Educators of the State Heartily Endorse the Proposed Plans.

Plans for providing free libraries and cymnasiums in all the cities and towns of the state are now well under way. the initiative steps having been taken at meeting of educators and other influential persons held yesterday aftertoon. The gathering convened in Barratt hall, and was called to order by Governor John C. Cutler, who named State Superintendent of Public Instruction A. C. Nelson as permanent chair-

man. Governor Cutter spoke at length on the efforts being made to place within the reach of both old and young of the state for study and for recreation of a profitable kind. The speaker said in part:

"The movement inaugurated here today appeals to me as one of the most important and far-reaching in the history of the state. And there is no doubt of its absolute worthiness, It aims at solving the great problems of employing the spare time of those whose leisure moments are vital and strong factors for good or evil. And because of this fact, we who are interested in this problem will gladly wel-

come any movement which promises a satisfactory solution. LAW A DEAD LETTER.

LAW A DEAD LETTER. "There has been for some time on the statute books of our state a law providing for and empowering the establishment of free public libraries in cities and towns. It has been to a great extent a dead" letter. This is due, I suppose, to the fact that no con-certed movement was instituted to put the law into effect. It is not likely that it was on account of a lack of in-terest in a matter of such vital im-portance to the young. "When the recent legislature con-

terest in a matter of such vital im-portance to the young. "When the recent legislature con-vened, cectain public-spirited ladies and gontlemen interested themselves in having the old law amended, so far as it applied to the smaller cities and towns, where private gymnasiums are not usually established, so as to al-low gymnasiums to be included. The law was so amended, and now I be-lieve that the promoters of this move-ment feel that they have a sufficient basis for the active work of instituting these libraries and gymnasums. "I think I-am safe in saying that during the four distinctively winter months, the average young man in the small cities and towns of Utah have more spare time than business men will ta studio.

small cities and towns of Utah have more spare time than business men and salaried clerks in the larger cities have during the entire year. It is also a fact that there are fewer means of smusement and recreation afforded them. These young men will not re-main at home during these long hours. We can not expect them to. They will seek some form of occupation and companionship. Where will it be found in the average town? You and companionship. Where will it be found in the average town? You know as well as I do that the saloon, the street corner, or the village store will harbor the great majority of these boys, largely because there is no other place that attracks them. sists. "The solution of the problem named is easily stated, though not so easily applied. It is to provide some kind of pleasurable and profitable occupa-tion. I want to emphasize that word 'occupation.' It is the cure-all for the evils that attack our youth. Where overwork has killed the body of one, undue leisure has stain the souls of scores. Idleness is often the result of wealth; it is always the cause of pover-ty and sin. As great a menace as ty and sin. As great a menace as confronts our country today is the corrupt indulgence of the so-called leleure classes. And it makes little beleure classes. And it makes little difference, so far as the general effect is concerned, whether the idle boy he the son of a millionaire or of a strug-

is concerned, whether the line and solves the son of a millionaire or of a strug-gling worker. "You will observe that I have placed emphasis on the point that the occu-pation provided for these boys dur-ing their leisure hours abouid be pleas-ant and attractive. This brings up the matter of the connection of gymma-vians with libraries. Where one young man will be attracted by a book or a magnazine, many will feel the magnetic force of a good set of gym-nasium appliances. There is a mag-netism in properly conducted athlette sports, which draws to them every-healthy boy. And it is a well known fact that no matter how hard the young man may work in his regular employ-ment, whether mentally or physically, the right kind of gymnastics will al-ways afford a rest.

the right kind of gymnasiues will ar-ways afford a rest. "In addition, these gymnasiums will attract to the libraries in connection with which they are operated, a large number of boys to whom the purely literary features will not appeal. And these hoys will gradually culturate the valuable habit of spending their lea-ment in a ln the company of good books. ure time in the company of good books
