

SPLENDID RECORD MADE BY Z. C. M. I.

Volume of Business During Year
In Excess of 1906 by Over
Half Million.

TWELVE PER CENT DIVIDEND

Sales for Year Were \$5,681,000—Rail-
road and Express Companies Re-
ceived During Year \$294,000.

At noon today the thirty-ninth an-
nual meeting of the stockholders of
Z. C. M. I. was held at the institu-
tion's office. Nearly three-fourths of
the stock was represented, either in
person or by proxy.

The president's report was read,
which, in concrete form, was as fol-
lows.

The volume of business transacted
in 1907 was in excess of that of 1906
by upwards of \$500,000. The sales
were \$5,681,000. There was paid to
railroad and express companies during
the year \$294,000.

The president referred to the panic
in the closing months of the past
year, and stated that locally some in-
convenience was felt, but the issuance
of clearing house certificates and
cashier's checks relieved the money-
market situation, and what at one time
appeared a serious condition was for-
tunately tided over. The certificates
referred to were all withdrawn many
months since. He characterized the
panic, to which he referred in his
report, as one not springing from in-
dustrial conditions, but from scarcity
of the necessary circulating medium
to meet the demand of an abnormally
expanded trade—speculation and in-
dustrial undertakings and better-
ments, requiring more money than
could be obtained from the usual
channels.

He thought the present outlook for
business was fairly good; however, the
commercial situation would need care
and nursing for some months to
come.

The manufacturing departments
had a successful year. The shoe fac-
tory turned out nearly 100,000 pairs

of boots and shoes, or an average of
over 300 pairs per day.

The clothing factory manufactured
some 17,000 dozen garments. The
net profits made were disposed of by
declaring a dividend of 12 per cent
for the current year, and adding suf-
ficient to the dividend fund to make
the dividend the same for 1909. Pro-
visions were made for the current
year's taxes and insurance, for new
wagons, harness, horses, machinery,
and various improvements to build-
ings, etc.

An election of officers and directors
for the ensuing year was held, re-
sulting in the re-election of the old
officers and directors, as follows:

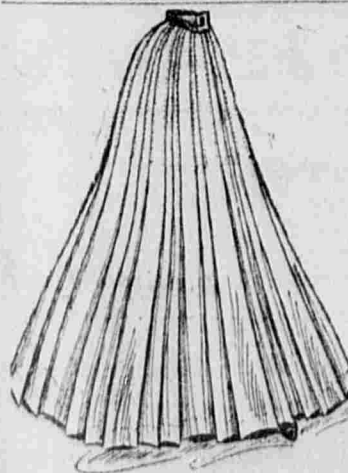

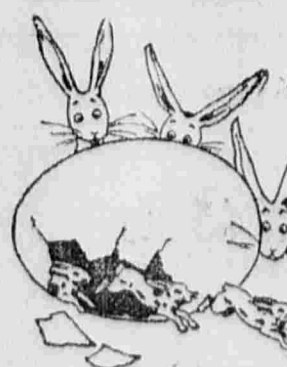
