The animals were then turned foose upon the same ground from which they had been gathered, and treated in every respect as they had been before. It is now over two weeks since the treatment, and not a single case of the dis-sease has developed. The test was thorough, and certainly seems to have oven a perfect success.—Exchange.

AIR AND SEA AS EARTH SHAKERS.-The simultaneous occurrence of earthquakes and hurricanes in Spain and its neighborhoon has led R. A. Proctor to make some interesting cal-

culations. A change of half an inch in the barometer over an area of 100,-000 square miles -about equal to that of the British Isles with the contained

seas-would mean a variation of some 42,000 million tons in the weight of the ir resting on that surface; one foot of extra tide extending outward ten miles would give an extra weight of 750,000,-000 tons on a coast 100 miles long Greater variations of barometric pressure occur, over much larger areas; and tides sometimes reach several feet beyond their usual limits, on much greater longths of coast. "I take it, then," Mr. Proctor concludes," that we may fairly consider that the externa action exerted on the earth's crust, as the tidal wave sweeps upon the shore line, as winds heap up the seas there, and as atmospheric pressure increases and diminishes – especially during the progress of great storms – must play a most important part in producing sub-terranean disturbances. Change in the Style of Noses. Several weeks ago an engraving of a ontrivance for straightening cropked ioses was published. It now appears that a Frenchman invented a machine ome years ago for changing the style of noses, by which it is said he amassed quite a fortune. A representative of the Philadelphia Times recently interviewed a surgeon on the subject and earned the following: "The nose is simply a piece of cartilage, and its slape can be changed with ease. Many people are troubled with noses whose hapes do not please their owners or heir owner's friends. The French machine consists of a small shell in two parts, hinged together. It is made of iron japanned or enameled. It is in shape inside that of a perfectly moulded nose, according to the type of the features of the wearer. Then you can obtain a Romen, Greelan, retrousse iqualine or any other shape you desire

to apply the instrument, the nose is first bathed in warm water at bedtime and thoroughly heated and softened. Uten it is well greased with olive oil, glycerine, vaseline or other oily sub-stance. Finally the nose improver is fixed on and the sides clasped together and the wearer keeps it on all night, taking care in the morning to wash in cold water only. It is a rather pain-ful process at first, but after the first
