BIG MONEY FOR FARMERS.

Handsome Returns for Month's Output of Sugar Beets.

Ogden, Nov. 14 .- The Amalgamated Ogden, Nov. 14.-The Annaigamated Sugar company is today distributing over \$100,600 to the beel growers for the Ogden factory district. This is the second monthly payroll to the beet growers. Last month, however, only a few beets had arrived at the factory when the payrolls were made out and only a little over \$15,000 was paid out for beets. Resides the payments for beets this month the regular payroll for employes of the company amounting to over \$2,000 is being made, making a to-tait of about \$125,000 distributed al-ready this year among the farmers and factory employes, which is mostly put into circulation through the local banks, the merchants receiving the greater part of this money. There will likely be only one more payment this year for beets, the middle of next month, when a similar amount will be disbursed. The farmers of Weber and adjoining counties have learned through experi-ence that the raising of sugar beets is one of the surget and most profitable of crops. The Ogden sugar factory is one of the greatest blessings that has ever come to this county, as it provides work for a large force of men for sev-eral months every fall in running the factory, it also gives the farmers a surg crop with excellent returns for their summer's labor, and in turn helps all lines of business as the beet producers crop with excellent returns for their summer's labor, and in turn helps all lines of business as the beet producers spead their money freely, putting sev-eral hundred thousand dollars into cir-culation in this city. An office force of six derks has been busy this week checking over the books from the vari-ous weighing stations established by the factory.

Ogden, Nov. 14.—On complaint of Mrs. Annie Beeeh, Clyde Moore, who lives at 1040 Twenty-fifth street, was placed under arrest yesterday afternoon on the charge of cruelly assaulting his two little children. The complaint charges that he cruelly beat his little boy, 2 years old, named Alvin Moore. After the issuance of the warrant for his ar-rest Sergeant Tout went to his home and took him in custody. He put up ball for his appearance. Mrs. Beech with other neighbors have complained to the police a number of times of Moore's extreme harshness to his chil-dren, the youngest of whom is but sev-en months old. It is claimed that he uses a razor strap on the little tots, whipping them brutally, their screams with pain and anguish from his cruel-ty attracting the neighbors, how will appear in court against him.
