June 24th, 1882.

Editor Deseret News:

I left Salt Lake City last October for a mission to the Southern States, since which time I have been laboring in Kentucky. My first month I labored with Brother J. G. Bigler in Butler and Muhlenberg counties, and sometime in November I left for Grayson County where I have been laboring most of the time, in connection with Brother L. Reynolds, in organizing a new field. No Elders have been here for thirty years, as far as we can find out.

We have held seventy meetings in this and the adjoining counties, but principally in this. At first we met with little opposition from the clergyman, they supposing that we had a different motive from theirs, but finally they were awakened to the fact that we preached the same gospel that the Apostle Paul preached, without guile and craft, and that at that time there was no small stir down this way, for we had turned away some of their paying members. Their craft was in danger, and their voices can be heard echoing through the country with all manner of falsehoods about the Latter-day Saints, which is causing the people to investigate the principles of the gospel.

Our meetings are very well attended. We baptised one person in February, and have since then baptised others this month. Thus we have had the privilege to sow and stay long enough to reap, and inasmuch as God gives the increase, we have a very flattering promise to harvest more. The Saints are feeling well and talk of gathering to the mountain of the Lord's House, and are by no means idle, but are busy in the ways of the Lord and walk in His paths.

We have had a very rainy winter and spring, also some hard wind, and one last Sunday which tore up the trees by the roots and unroofed buildings. The Lord is backing up the testimony of His servants by signs, wonders, hailstorms, fires, etc., which are signs of the near approach of the coming of the Son of Man.

Feeling an interest in the faith and prayers of the Saints, I remain your brother in the only true Gospel of Christ.

Houses Built of Cotton.

Of all substances apparently the least likely to be used in the construction of a fine building, cotton would perhaps take first rank and paper the second; and yet both these materials, says The Associated Press, are actually being employed for the purpose indicated, and their use will probably extend. Compressed paper pulp is successfully used in the manufacture of cotton, and wall paneling and for other similar purposes, with the result that all risk of warping and cracking is obviated, while increased lightness is attained, and the fear of dry rot is forever banished. Paper-maché, after having served a useful purpose in an unobtrusive manner for years as a material for boxes, trays, pens, and other such light articles, has now suddenly assumed a still more important position in the industrial world. A still more sudden and startling advance has been made in the employment of cotton as a building material. A preparation called celloloid, in which cotton is a leading ingredient, has been used as a substitute for ivory in the manufacture of such articles as billiard balls and paper cutters, and now a Canadian manufacturer has patented a process by which compressed cotton may be used not merely for doors and window-frames but for the whole facade of large buildings. This enormous and increasing demand for paper for its normal use as a printing and writing material, prevents the extended use of paper-maché as a building material, for which it is so well fitted in so many ways; but the production of cotton is practically unlimited, and there seems to be a large field available for its use in its new capacity as a substitute for brick—or at least plaster and wood. Treated with certain chemicals and compressed, it can be made perfectly fire-proof and as hard as stone, absolutely air and damp proof; and a material is thus produced admirably adapted for lining—internal and external—of buildings of which the shell may or may not be constructed of other material, while it easily lends itself to decorative purposes.
