To the Editor: Battle Creek, Mich., Nov. 2 .- There has recently been considerable said about establishing a medical college in

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connection with the University of Utah. It might be of interest to the readers of the "News" to know the attitude of leading physicians toward the establishment of /new medical colleges in America. Several years ago Dr. Cathell of Baltimore said in his popular book "The Physician Himself:" "There has been of late years a disproportionate annual addition to our already over-

chuwded profession, and the colleges of the United States are still turning them out at the rate of more than 2,000 a year, without counting the ready-made physicians gotten by immigration. The result is there are now in every community, probably, three or four doctors where one is really needed. Canada has one for every 1,193 inhabitants, Austria one for every 2,500, Germany one for every 3,000, Great Britain one for every 1,652, France one for every 1,814, while we of the United States, blessed in physicians as in everything else, have, counting both regulars and irregulars, one for every 600; druggists in proportion."

Since the above was written we have made wonderful progress. The annual output of the medical colleges was then 2,000; it is now 6,000. Quackery in medicine and irregular practitioners have increased at a much greater ratio and there is no evidence that diseas has disappeared. Anyone who reads current medical literature must be im-pressed with the fact that the profession is overcrowded. This is evident to any one who will take the trouble to investigate. The following editorial ap-peared in the Journal of the American Medical Association, July 27, 1901.

OVER-SUPPLY OF MEDICAL GRAD-UATES.

"There are probably betweeen 115,000 and 125,000 medical practitioners in the United States, or one to about every 600 of the populace. Every year about 1,600 of them more or less, may be expected to die. The loss by emigration is practically nothing. The territory is rapidly being filled up and some of th newer states have already a larger pro portion of physicians than some of the older ones. In 1890 we were sixty-five millions, in 1900 we are seventy-five, an average net annual increase of 1,000,000, which at the ratio of one physician to (repeople (hardly a living ratio for the doctor) would make places for nearly This, therefore, with the 1,600 or so vacancies by death would make room for nearly 3,300 new doctors each year, for nearly 3,300 new doctors each year, provided the same annual in-crease in population continues, which is perhaps dubicus. Our 160 medical colleges, however, turn out an-nually a crop of nearly 6,000 graduates, or over 2,000 more than can thus be pro-vided for These forces is should be vided for. These figures, it should be remembered, do not include a vast number of off-colored practitioners who nevertheless have their share of public patronage and thus serve to curtail the means of support of the recognized physicians, nor the accessions from outside the country by immigration. These facts are reviewed in a recent issue of the Chicago Tribune with comments such as would naturally be made upon such a showing. It is well for us to occasionally refresh our memory with these figures, bearing as they do on

It is cortain that the multiplication of doctor factories has gone far enough in this country, though as yet it does not seem to have been checked.
