Celery jelly is a new thing, and has been invented to go with fruit and nut salads. Good Housekeeping gives di-rections for making it. Cover two cupil of celery, cut in fine pieces, with one pint of hot water. Add a few slices of onion, a little parsley, salt and pap-rika. Let simmer for half an hour or longer, then strain through a double cheesecloth. Add to the celery water two tablespoonfuls of gelatine softened in cold water, and the juice of a lemtwo tablespoontuls of genutne softened in cold water, and the juice of a lem-on. Strain again into a large platter wet with ice water. The jelly should be about an inch thick. When it is cold and quite stiff, cut in squares or any desired shape, and use it to gar-nish the salad. any desired shared nish the salad.

Canning fruit without sugar has come to be quite the approved method, and those who have tried it insist that fruit so canned tastes as it did when perfectly fresh. The process is simple. Prepare the fruit in the usual manner, place in porcelain-lined pre-serving kettles, or enamel dish pans kept for the purpose, and put over it enough cold water to cover.
