Bartlett Tripp, an Old Utah Man, Enroute to the Islands as Commissioner.

REPRESENTS THE UNITED STATES

Mr. E. J. Wood Predicts That All Our Government Wants is the Splendid Harbor of Pago Pago, and That She Will Get It.—Letter From Samoa.

An old Salt Lake, Hon. Harriet Tritton, who has relatives here in the persons of Dr. and Mrs. G. A. Tripp, Mrs. F. Fenton and Mrs. Dr. Howard, both of whom are his nieces, arrived in this city today, en route to Samoa, where he goes as American commissioner with Hon. C. H. H. Elliott and Baron Speck von Sternberg, English and German commissioners, respectively, to assist in the enforcement of the difficulties now existing in those islands.

who had created a provisional government, to lay down their arms, the rebels had agreed to give up their flag but issued a counter proclamation which concluded as follows: "I, the German consul general, constitute myself the representative of the government of Samoa until I have received contrary instructions from my government."

CHIEF JUSTICE CHAMBERS.

"It is very strange," said Mr. Wood, "that Germany has received several demands that Mataafa must not be king under any circumstances, as he had ambushed and killed three Englishmen, but he is not to be blamed. Germany does not actually want Mataafa; we see not, but imagine the English are of the opinion that the English will not allow the natives now that will make her the queen of the islands, as she has millions of men invested in Samoa, and the English are afraid of Germany sending Mataafa with the last moment." Then Mr. Wood said it was apparent that America would do the same through the scheme immediately.

SALE OF NATIVES.

"It can," continued Mr. Wood, "be seen that Chief Justice Chambers has started the interest of the natives in the sale of natives, and has served them well in leading, securing, and frequently secured the little hundreds of acres of land which the natives have given him. The natives under the treaty may have been stripped, but the English and American officials are held largely responsible for the difficulty that has arisen in the islands through Mataafa, her council and the natives that resulted in the killing of American and English naval officers and sailors of the United States and the claim of the United States. When Admiral Kaula and British Consul Mataafa asked Pier Ross to join in the sale of natives, Pier Ross said, 'I am sorry to say that Mataafa Tano is to be the rightful King and commanding the rebels,

FEAR AMERICAN COMPETITION.

Situation is Truly Serious for British Manufacturers.

SUNDAY PAPERS DENOUNCED.

Nonconformists Bitter Against Them—Sidney Webb Says They Disgrace America's Name and Fame.

A protest meeting was held in London on Saturday evening, against the nonconformist papers. Mr. Sidney Webb, chairman of the Technical Education Committee, told the meeting that the political economy of the tiny of London and Workington's college of Economics and Political Science, was discrediting and disgracing the name and fame of America.

TOO ELATION CARE.

As a result of the incident of the Elgin spring meeting, which resulted in the disqualification of Mr. Edward D. C. This would indicate that the English jockey before him has a repetition of the last race lost."

The same writer deduces that tactics of certain jockeys toward foul riding should be blamed for the result.

AMERICAN COMPETITION.

American industrial competition has made some prominently in the front this week. Hardly a day has passed without some article appearing in the subject in the London newspapers.

The Athenee hotel contract, which has almost annihilated the importance of the House of Commons on Thursday, when the government was asked a string of parliamentary questions for foreign office, Right Hon. William St. John Brodrick, was only able to reply that the government had no information which was contained in the report recently issued by Lord Cromer. The British government has not yet

been able to give a lengthy account of its own policy in regard to the question, but he said he had taken orders for the American whisky. That is his business, he reiterated, and through the chairman of the board of trade he has directed the manager of that company to take an interest in that company.

Mr. Brodrick has given a lengthy account of American competition in the iron trade and called attention to the result, the result being that English prices and exports alike are not entirely held by home and continental competition, but are also affected by the prevailing rate of the markets and industrial situation generally in the United States.

It appears that a notable case in evidence was the combined effort of the British manufacturers to keep up their position in the initial coil of that branch of the business, the Americans taking the lead in the British market.

The Times remarks: "The situation is daily getting worse for the British manufacturers, as they are asking two fundamental questions, which must inevitably result in the future British exports and prices, and whether it is worth while continuing on under such an overwhelming pressure."

Dealing with the imports of Americans, the Times adds: "The price of the British manufacturers' mind is somewhat altered by the fact that prices are not only above even the average man's expectations for a boom, the duration of which is the uppermost consideration."

The article concludes with the hopeful remark that there is less reason to apprehend a flood of American imports of iron than there was in 1898 than there was last year.
