

PROHIBITION WOMEN'S THEME

Mrs. Emily S. Richards Exhorts horts Auditors to Use Franchise for Temperance.

FOR ACTIVITY IN POLITICS

Mrs. Julia P. M. Farnsworth Also Speaks at Length on Same Subject at Relief Society Conference.

The afternoon and closing session of the Relief society conference convened in the Assembly hall, commencing at 2 p. m. yesterday.

A number of spirited addresses were delivered, and the musical exercises given were very interesting.

President Bathsheba W. Smith extended a welcome to the congregation in a few well chosen words, promoting a feeling of interest and their three propositions indicated will have a chance to meet him during the sessions of conference.

MRS. E. S. RICHARDS.

Mrs. Emily S. Richards read the intention of the Prophet Joseph Smith in organizing the Relief society for the benefit of women, but for the welfare of the entire human family.

One great phase of woman's work in Utah and her sister states of Idaho, Wyoming and Colorado, said Mrs. Richards, is the exercise of the franchise.

The women's Democratic club has completed arrangements for the Thomas Jefferson celebration to be held at Odeon hall Wednesday evening, April 8.

The speakers will be Hon. B. H. Roberts, F. R. Nebeker, W. M. Roylance, J. F. Tolton and A. L. Bywater, mayor of Ogden.

The speaker strongly admonished women to become active in politics to the extent of seeing that only temperate men are elected to public office, and that legislators shall be chosen who will see to it that laws are passed regulating the liquor traffic, even to the extent of prohibition.

The women who have lived and labored in the Relief society are an great and as deserving of honor as were the women of the Bible, with the single exception of the mother of the Son of God," declared Mrs. Emmellio B. Wells.

Speaking of the spread of Relief society work, Mrs. Wells stated that 26 branches had lately been organized in Europe by Mrs. R. B. Penrose, a member of the board. The Relief society is now represented in every part of the civilized world.

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BOARD OF WORKS AWARDS CONTRACT

Pat Moran Will Pave First South With Two Grades of Asphalt.

The board made a request on the city council to refund to Davis & Heuser the sum of \$100, the amount of the certified check forfeited by the firm when they declined to sign up on a contract awarded them on sewer extension 170.

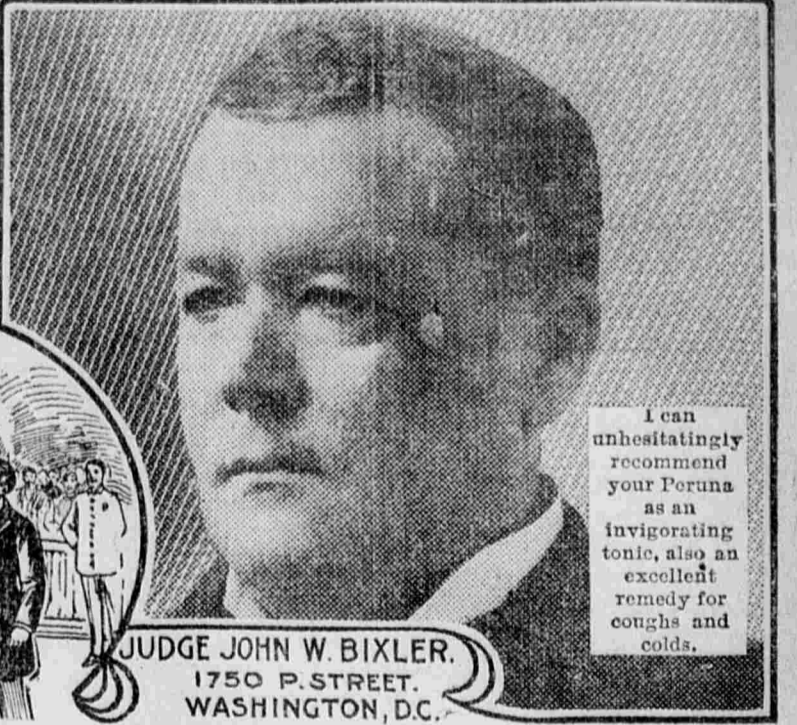
The Utah Academy of Sciences, recently organized in this city, begins its three days' sessions with two lectures this evening in the Packard public library.
