A SWELTERING NIGHT. Mercury Stood at 82 at Six o'clock

This Morning.

Salt Lake last night endured a night of sweltering, stifling heat, and sleep. ing apartments not provided with free ventilation were generally deserted. The lowest point reached by the mercury after "bed time" during the entire night was 74 degrees. This was at :45 a. m., and from that time it climbed steadily upward until 6 o'clock this morning, when the thermometer at the weather bureau registered 82. Up to 12:30 p. m. today, the instrument showed a slightly lower tempera ture than vesterday forenoon, register ing 96 degrees at the noon hour, but
